human one of how to devise a method of running a nationalised industry which the only people capable of running that industry are prepared to accept and under which they are prepared to work. If that could be devised, there are certainly other problems to solve. But unless it can be devised the other problems cannot even be sensibly discussed.

It is not on this same issue that the breakdown has come. The U. K. government has put forward first one suggestion, then another. Both have been rejected. The Persian government has put forward no proposal of any kind which even begins to take account of this fundamental human question - how to persuade the only people who can in fact run their nationalised industry to run it.

It is not an issue between the Persian government and the U. K. government. It is not an issue between "nationalisation" and "imperialism". It is an issue between a would-be employer - the National Iranian Oil Company - and the staff which they say they wish, and need to employ.

Mr. Stokes has, in a sense, been acting as mediator between the prospective employer and the prospective staff. The prospective employer has refused the perfectly reasonable terms upon which the prospective staff are prepared to work. And that being so, there is no point in discussing other matters. But what the employer intends to do with an oil industry which has no staff capable of running it is not a question for Doctor Mousadeck and his colleagues.

Sites & Monuments Board To Erect Schurman Memorial

A bronze plaque, commemorating the entry of Prince Edward Island into Confederation, has been placed on the eastern pillar at the entrance to the Provincial Building by the Historical Sites and Monuments Board of Canada, who also erect a monument on recently acquired ground in Freetown, in honour of Jacob Gould Schurman, in the near future.

The following words are inscribed on the plaque, the unveiling of which is to be announced later: "Prince Edward Island becomes a Province of Canada, 1873."

"Cradled on the waves, this beautiful Island was successively named Abegweil, Saint Jean, and Prince Edward, to denote Micmac, French and English regimes. Discovered and settled by the French, it finally became a British colony in 1763. English, Scottish and Irish settlers joined the French inhabitants to form a sturdy pioneer stock and to build primary industries of agriculture and fishing. Considering the original terms of Confederation unfavourable, Prince Edward Island did not join the Dominion until July 1873. Hon. William Cleaver Francis Robinson was the first Lieutenant-Governor and Hon. James C. Pope, the first Premier."

The Freetown monument will be erected close to the farm where James Gould Schurman was born in 1854 and spent the early years of his life on land acquired from Mr. Everett Schurman, a nephew. An internationally known educationalist and United States diplomat, the late Mr. Schurman was a graduate of the University of London, attended the Universities of Edinburgh, Heidelberg, Berlin and Göttingen, and became President of Cornell University after a period of teaching at Acadia and Dalhousie Universities in the Maritimes.

In the diplomatic service of the United States, he was Minister to Greece, Ambassador to China, and from 1925-1930, Ambassador to Germany.
