P.E. Island Draggers May Add New Fish To Catch

Prince Edward Island draggers are fishing a new kind of fish in an experiment now underway. It is economically feasible, it was learned last night from Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Fisheries for this province. The Fishermen's Loan Board is making a loan available for a 65-foot boat that will be considerably larger, more powerful and more seaworthy than the 60-foot boats now in use. There is no experiment about the boat itself but the department is anxious to learn if this larger boat can be fished more economically than the smaller type, it was learned. The new type of fish is commonly called Red Fish. Rose fish, Ocean perch among other names. It is available beyond the 90-fathom contour and may be fished in water up to 130 fathoms in depth. It is an oily fish to the mackerel. It is used for filleting and as such is readily saleable in the United States, and in Canada. It is also used for fish sticks. The body frame that is left is used for fish meal as well as oil, the Minister explained. However the possibility of bringing a new type of fish to filleting plants in this province is only a part of the experiment, it was learned. The department is anxious to learn if more fish can be iced at slower cost per unit in the larger boat which calls for the same crew five men as the 60 footer. The larger boat can carry 90,000 lbs. of fish, carries 12 to 15 tons of ice compared to the 60,000 lbs. of fish and 8 to 10 tons of the smaller dragger. The 65-footer has a bigger and more powerful engine—8 cylinder, 152 horse-

power compared to 120 horsepower—and its winch can haul the longer, stronger wire cable that will be used for fishing in the deeper water. The cable is 9-16 inch and each spool will carry about 400 fathoms of 2400 feet.

In making the loan available for Mr. Gallant who already has a dragger, the department is not departing from its rule of not assisting a fisherman get more than one boat. This is the exception to the rule. We wanted to get accurate information on the economics of fishing this size boat and we needed a man of proven ability to fish the boat, the Minister explained. Mr. Gallant was the first fisherman in the province to pay off the loan on his dragger to the Loan Board. He has established an excellent record he took more than one and one-quarter million pounds of groundfish in one year—and has been consistently effective as a dragger operator, it was explained. The new boat is being built by Wagstaff and Hatfield Ltd. of Port Greville, close to Parrasboro, Nova Scotia and is expected to be ready by spring.

Mayor Johnstone Elated With Federal Works Plans

Johnstone yesterday regarding the federal government's announcement that a new runway at the Charlottetown airport and marine wharf facilities will be constructed involving expenditures of close to \$3,000,000. Mayor Johnstone noted that previous Councils in conjunction with the Charlottetown Board of Trade have made repeated representations to the federal government for the building of this runway. "It is gratifying to learn that these representations are now to be acted upon. The building of the runway and the marine development will provide employment and additional income for many of our citizens, and will certainly improve air transport between Charlottetown and the mainland," he said. "The Charlottetown City Council looks forward with anticipation to the announcement of further details of these expenditures," the Mayor added.

Island Bred Sow Makes Canadian Registry Record

Mr. John Anderson, Westville, N. S., is the proud owner of the sow Breezehill 35K which recently has completed an Advanced Registry test with a slaughter test score of 96. This is the highest score ever made in Canada. The feed consumption on this test was equivalent to 546 pounds to bring the pigs from 30 pounds to 200 pounds live weight. Mr. Fred Matheson, Dundas, P. E. I., owns the dam, Breezehill Jean 3G, which also has made a Canadian record by having five of her daughters all make scores of 90 or over. Mr. Harrison Green, Kingston P.E.I., and Mr. J.H. MacPhail, New Haven, P. E. I., own litter mate sisters of 35K Mr. Green's sow has a score of 90 and Mr. MacPhail's 93. The sire of Mr. Anderson's qualifying litter was Kimberley Mac 61K, bred by N. W. MacLeod and Sons, Dundas, P. E. I. The dam of this sire has a score of 92. Mr. Rowell Boswell's Junior Champion boar at Charlottetown last year is a brother of 61K. Another brother was in the herd of Oliver Meek, French River, P. E. I. Another Canadian record has been made by the boar Kimberley Mac 76K, owned by John H. Colwill, Clyde River, P. E. I. This boar on six tested litters has four with scores of 90 or over and one with 89. It is this consistent high scoring that is responsible for the steadily increasing demand from other provinces for Island Yorkshire breeding stock. Messrs. Matheson and MacLeod recently shipped three boars to Edmonton, Alberta.

British Group Launch Bid For Nuclear Disarmament

By ALAN HARVEY Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON (CP) — With almost religious fervor, a group of British artists, scientists, novelists and churchmen has launched a bid for nuclear disarmament. The campaign opened this week with a series of mass meetings and will gather momentum early in April with a four-day march from Trafalgar Square to Aldermaston atomic weapons plant. Committees are being set up across the country to enlist public support for banning the hydrogen bomb, which the organizers say poses the "supreme moral issue" of the times. They would have Britain renounce it unilaterally if need be. The president of the campaign, philosopher Bertrand Russell, said that as things go now it is an "even chance" whether any human being will be alive 40 years from now. Another speaker at the kickoff rally in London, Canon John Collins, said he thinks the by-election result at Rochdale is just a "fla bite" compared with what may happen to politicians who persist in arming Britain with nuclear weapons.

Those present undoubtedly included pacifists and probably Communist sympathizers. Prominent persons associated with the movement are author Rose Macaulay, Professor C. H. Waddington, nuclear scientist John Rotblat, actresses Flora Robson and Dame Edith Evans, playwright J. B. Priestley and historian Alan Taylor. The campaign coincides with stirrings of unrest among some Conservative backbenchers on the British government's nuclear policy. Concern has been caused by the statement in last Thursday's white paper implying that Britain would be prepared to use the H-bomb in reply to Communist aggression—even aggression by conventional forces.

Battle Storm To Race Stork

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP) — A farmer's horse-drawn sleigh and a village taxi battled 18 miles through snowdrifts Monday night to win a race with the stork. Five minutes after she won the dash from her farm home to the Kitchener hospital's delivery room, Mrs. John Dittich gave birth to a son. A nurse said: "This is the most exciting birth we've had." Mrs. Dittich warned her husband Monday the child's arrival was imminent. The roads were blocked and Dittich had to walk from their farm home to the village of Linwood, 13 miles northwest of here, for help. He convinced township officials he needed a snowplow to get his wife out. Dittich returned to his wife. Before the snowplow arrived, however, he borrowed a team and old-fashioned box sleigh, bundled his wife into it and drove two miles through 15-below-zero weather and swirling snow to Linwood. The expectant mother was moved to Tommy Deckert's taxi and the final race to hospital began. Crowds were out at several villages to shout encouragement as Deckert sped through. "I made the last 10 miles in nothing flat," he said. "I felt certain every minute the child was about to be born in my cab."

Appeal Low Freight Rates

OTTAWA (CP) — The board of transport commissioners reserved decision Tuesday on whether truckers have the right to apply to the board for disallowance of low freight rates put into effect by the railways in Western Canada last year. The two transcontinental railways argued that the truckers, who are under provincial jurisdiction, have no status before the federal regulatory board. The highway carriers, in their first attempt to initiate a case before the board, claimed the Railway Act gives them such status. H. E. B. Coyne, counsel for Canadian Trucking Associations, said the act provides that no person or company shall be subject to "any unreasonable prejudice or disadvantage" through railway rates. He said that applies to trucking firms whose rates were undercut by the railways in the West. CNR counsel W. G. Boyd charged that the truckers, in seeking to have the rail rates disallowed, were trying to have railway shippers subsidize their operations.
