

# McDermott Throws Five-Hitter At Yanks; Maglie Beats Dodgers Again

(Canadian Press) Washington Senators thumped New York Yankees 9-3 in Yankee Stadium Sunday as lefthanded Mickey McDermott shackled the world champions by pitching a five-hitter. Meanwhile the Senators rapped out 13 hits at the expense of three New York hurlers.

Harvey Kuen and big Wat Dropp were the big guns as Detroit Tigers rapped three Baltimore pitchers for 15 hits and an 8-3 victory over the Orioles at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium.

In other American League action, Chicago White Sox downed Cleveland Indians for the second time in a row, 6-2 and Philadelphia Athletics and Boston Red Sox split a doubleheader. The A's won the first 6-4 and Boston took the nightcap 4-3 in 13 innings.

and Curt Simmons, 6-0 and 7-1. The other National League game, St. Louis Cardinals nipped Chicago Cubs 6-4 in the first game of a scheduled doubleheader. The second game was called because of darkness after two scoreless innings.

McDermott, fourth straight lefthander to start against New York, had a two-hitter going for seven innings. He wanted in the eighth when three more came, including a homer by Hans Bauer and a tremendous triple by Mickey Mantle. Mantle's blow was off the centerfield bleacher wall, the first time in the memory of Yankee writers that a ball had reached the distant barrier on the fly. McDermott was lifted for a pinch-hitter in the ninth and right-hander Sonny Dixon finished.

Catcher Joe Tipton led the Nats' 13-hit assault with three singles. Rookie righthander Bob Grim, who went out in the seventh, was the loser.

At Baltimore, Kuen and Dropp, who drove in three runs, each collected two singles and a double to ease the way for Steve Gromek to record his second victory of the season, both at the expense of the Orioles.

The fourth in a series of five games and enabled the Tigers to remain atop the American League.

At Cleveland the White Sox rang up their victory with five runs in the fifth inning on homers by Jim Rivera and Minnie Miñoso. The game was called after six innings because of rain and the second game of a scheduled doubleheader was postponed.

League's Longest Game

On Saturday, Chicago Cubs rolled up their highest score in 32 years as they won 23-13 from St. Louis Cardinals in the longest game ever played in the National League—three hours and 43 minutes. A 10-run fifth inning for Chicago was a feature as the Cubs pounded six Cardinals' pitchers for 20 hits while three Chicago hurlers gave up 15. Previous longest game was 3:38 between Brooklyn and New York Sept. 6, 1932. The major league record is 5:52 set by Boston Red Sox and New York Yankees last May.

The only other National League game, Milwaukee defeated Cincinnati Reds 5-1 as Lew Burdette hurled a seven-hitter.

In the American League, Detroit, behind the five-hit pitching of Ned Garver, won a 1-0 victory over Baltimore Orioles and Joe Coleman. The Tigers got only three hits but two were grouped in the second for the game's only run.

Chicago White Sox won their first game of the season, defeating Cleveland 8-1 on Bob Keegan's four-hitter.

There was considerable writing a few weeks ago about Tony Leswick's chances of obtaining a Detroit Red Wings contract next year. There was some speculation that his hopes of remaining in Detroit would rest on his showing in the play-offs. If such were the case then Tony Leswick not only should remain with the Wings but should be given a considerable pay boost when it comes time for him to sign a contract. It is unlikely that Leswick will again ascend to the heights which he reached in the play-offs just completed but even if he doesn't the Red Wings will never owe him anything.

The little guy joined a select group last Friday night when he fired that 30 foot shot which beat Gerry MacNeill and won the Stanley Cup for the Detroit Red Wings before the largest crowd of fans ever to enter the Olympia Gardens at Detroit. Very few hockey players have ever had the honor of scoring the overtime goal of the final game to give their team the world's professional hockey championship. For Leswick, who ranked among the second raters during the league schedule, it must have been the supreme thrill of his career.

Tony Leswick is a younger brother of Pete Leswick who played in Maritime Major Hockey League with the Halifax Saints two years ago. It will be recalled that Pete Leswick was one of the smartest and most opportune players ever to perform here and that nearly every goal he scored in that lamented four game series with the Islanders in 1952 was either the winning or a winning one. Evidently his young brother acquired the same ability for in play-offs this year the younger Leswick came through with two game winning goals.

At 31 years of age Tony Leswick is the second oldest player on the Red Wings roster, being one year younger than Bob Geyl, who like wine, keeps improving with age. He broke into the National Hockey League with the New York Rangers in 1945. The following year he had his best season in the majors as he scored 27 goals and assisted on 14 more for a total of 41 points. The next year he scored 24 goals and assisted on 16. He played with the Rangers for six years before being traded to Detroit where he has been used considerably in penalty killing and defensive roles. At times in games against the Canadiens he has been assigned the task of shadowing Rocket Richard.

The Rocket was on the ice when Leswick scored the goal to end the series last Friday. In fact the Rocket and Elmer Lach had just completed a sortie into Saginaw territory before Glen Skov and Leswick started the return play which closed the series. Exactly one year before to the night, hour and very close to the minute Lach and Richard ended another Stanley Cup series in Montreal with Elmer Lach firing the rubber part of Jim Bennett to win the Stanley Cup. Those two great forwards almost combined to win it for Montreal again this year when Lach sent the Rocket in on Sawchuk during the dying minutes of the third period but the Rocket broke his stick and although he managed to get the puck into the net the goal was called back.

Terry Sawchuk, another fellow about whom there has been some trade talk, saved the series for the Wings in the third period of the final game with his great work in nets. It was Sawchuk's brilliance which prevented Gaye Stewart from being the series hero and ending the season in Frank Merriwell fashion. We have our doubts about the Wings ever consenting to trade Sawchuk to another club. They go away with such a move once they deal Harry Lumley to Chicago but they knew what they had in Sawchuk.

One of the disappointments of the series was the showing of the Canadiens line of Bellevue, Geoff and Moore. This trio blasted Boston out of the ivory hut in four games but failed to do much blasting against the Red Wings. As usual when the going was toughest the Canadiens had to fall back on the old reliables like Lach, Richard and Harvey. The Rocket had to be content with scoring three goals but only team-mate Busher Currie scored as many in the series finals. Richard set another record at Montreal this year when he scored the first and last goals of the season on the Forum ice. He was set up in typical fashion by Lach for the final goal and many observers believe that this was Lach's farewell to the Forum fans.

It was hockey justice that the Red Wings should win the Stanley Cup this year. Over the season they proved that they had the best team as they won the League championship with five games to spare. Defensively they are a stronger club than the Canadiens while up front the clubs rate about a par. The Wings following a tough series with the Leafs appeared to be a more tired club towards the end of the series but they rebounded like champions to redeem themselves for their showing of a year ago.

**Death Here Saturday Of Great Long Distance Runner**

The heart of the greatest long distance runner ever produced in this province and the king of long distance men in the Maritime Provinces stopped beating on Saturday morning in the Charlotetown Hospital.

That heart belonged to Michael "Mike" Thomas who over 40 years ago set a Maritime record that still stands when he won the Halifax Herald ten mile road race three times in succession.

During the years he was outstanding competitor in the Maritimes he participated in the Boston Marathon where he distinguished himself by finishing 19th on his first attempt and 26th on his second try.

Mike Thomas, who was 70 years old at the time of his death, commenced running shortly after the turn of the century on a quarter-mile track made by the Indians at Lennox Island.

He won several Island and Maritime races before competing in the Halifax Herald competitions. He led the field in this 10

miile grind during the years 1908, 1909 and 1910 to set a three year record that has never been broken.

In 1909 he ran in the gruelling Boston Marathon and crossed the finish line in 19th position. He tried again the following year and placed 26th.

He had many fine tributes as a runner but none more important than his seemingly endless stamina. Mike could run for hour after hour eating up ground with his short strides without showing signs of fatigue.

For many years following his retirement as a runner he lived at Southport. Two years ago this summer he suffered the most tragic loss of his career when fire destroyed his residence claiming the lives of his wife and young daughter.

He is survived by five daughters all of whom reside outside the Province. They are Laura, Rachel, Blanche, Nanette and Lillian.

The funeral will be held on Tuesday morning form the Hennessy Funeral Home at 8:45 to St. Dunstan's Basilica for Requiem High Mass.
