S'ide Citizens Asked To Help Save Power At Peak Loads

The co-operation of Summerside citizens and business concerns in the collective conservation of electricity in late afternoon and evening, especially between four-thirty and five-thirty p.m., with special emphasis on Friday night extending to eight p.m., was asked by Councillor Dr. H.E. Clark at the regular November meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening.

The co-operation of citizens in this matter was necessary, he said, to keep electrical supply costs to the present level, and pointed out that a satisfactory response to this appeal could result in a substantial financial saving by the town.

In making this suggestion Councillor Clark presented a chart which revealed that the peak of the electrical load had increased about ten percent above what it was at this time last year.

He explained that the Summerside Electric Light Department has a contract with Maritime Electric Company by which spare electrical energy can be purchased from Maritime Electric Company at a cost based on the demand in excess of 2100 K.W.

This peak, last year, was reached during Christmas week when the electrical consumption at one point reached a peak of 2470 K.W. and on this basis the town had to pay \$492.00 for the month of December and the succeeding eleven months, however, an adjustment was made in this amount in April due to the loss of customers West of Summerside which were taken over by Maritime Electric Company in April.

On Tuesday night of this week the peak reached 2290 K.W., and on this basis Councillor Clark feared that increased seasonal demand on electricity during the next few weeks would result in a higher peak than last year, with resulting higher costs having to be paid for standby service which Maritime Electric Company have
