

# Pierre Rossignol Leads Cup Trials

MONCTON (CP) — Pierre Rossignol, a young better than former junior king, fired the top round Sunday. He had a 71. Richard Bagnell of Fredericton was Saturday's leader with a 74. He rocketed to a 79 yesterday for a 36-hole score of 153. Sixty-five amateurs are playing in the trials, restricted to golfers with handicaps of eight or less.

**A CHARLOTTETOWN**

In the first 18 holes of the total 90-hole trials, high winds at Charlottetown's Belvedere course Saturday kept par 71 an unreachable target.

Heading the field with a three-over-par 74 was Richard Bagnell, of Fredericton.

Three New Brunswick players were a stroke behind with 75. They were Kees Huibers of Restigouche, F. Drumme of Fredericton and P. Rossignol of Bathurst.

Two strokes back of leader Bagnell were six players — Bill Bishop of Saint John Riverdale, Bill Beer of Charlottetown; Gene Mealy of Riverdale; Ned Bean of Restigouche; Ron Vanbuskirk of Moncton; and Lou Beattie of Woodstock, N.B.

Soft fairways, hard greens and almost windless conditions made for lower scores on the par 70 Moncton course Sunday.

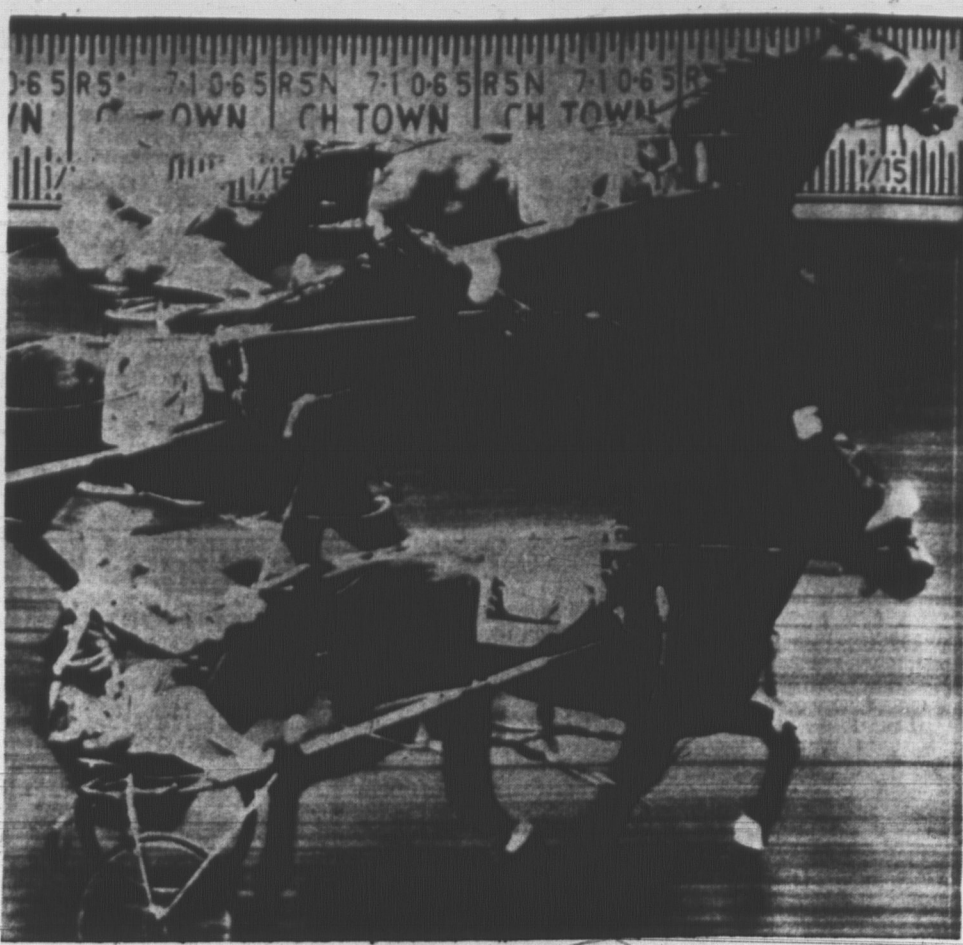

Rossignol, a member of the N.B.-P.E.I. junior team last year, carded rounds of 75-73-148. Par for the Belvedere course at Charlottetown, where Saturday's round was played, is 72. Par for the Moncton links is 70. Sunday's 18 holes were played at the Moncton Golf Club.

Lou Beatty of Woodstock and Bill Bishop of Saint John Riverdale, two former Willington Cup team members, share second place at 149. Both toured the island course with a four-over-par 76 they had 73 Sunday.

# Aussie Runner Ron Clarke Sets Fantastic New Mark

LONDON (AP) — Ron Clarke of Australia set the most fantastic of all his world records Saturday — 12:52.4 for the three miles in a history-making run at London's White City Stadium.

No man had ever cracked 13 minutes before.

The amazing 28-year-old Australian knocked eight seconds off his old record of 13:00.4.

That was set at Compton, Calif., last month and is still awaiting ratification.

Clarke made his new mark on a track made over by rain. He ran the last three-quarters of a mile on his own, with no other runner within yards of him.

The 16,000 fans rose from their seats and surged towards the barrier as the bell went for the last of the 12 laps.

Clarke came down the final straight lapping stragglers in the track.

The Australian also holds the world records on pending 1.6 records for 10 miles, 10,000 metres (about 6¼ miles) and 5,000 metres (3 miles, 188 yards).

**SET THE PACE**

Clarke set the pace from the start, helped by Gerry Lindgren of Spokane, Wash. They ran so fast that experts thought they could never keep up the pace.

Lindgren took second in 13:04.2 — the fastest ever by an American.

This was how Clarke's run went:

At one mile he clocked 4:15.4 and was 4.20 seconds inside his previous world record schedule.

At the halfway mark, 1½ miles, he was clocked 6:26.0 and was eight seconds inside schedule.

Soon after the start of the third mile Clarke looked over his shoulder at Lindgren, and found that the little American was flagging. He dropped behind, and Clarke ground on alone.

At 3 miles, with one lap to go, Clarke was clocked in 11:51.3 and was now only 2¼ seconds inside schedule.

From then on his running seemed superhuman. He strode further and further away from Lindgren as the crowd became excited.

**GIVES LINDGREN CREDIT**

Afterwards, however, Clarke said Lindgren was the man who made the race.

"He made the pace in the fourth lap," Clarke said. "That was the most vital lap in the race."

"With four laps to go, he was still pressing me. He is a great little runner."

"That was the stage at which I made my biggest effort. I knew I had to break him. It was then that the world record was made."

With two laps to go, Clarke was feeling the strain.

"I was desperately tired. I was thinking: 'This must be the last lap. Can I make it?' But it wasn't the last lap."

National records also were broken by Lajos Mececs of Hungary, third in 13:07.6, and Derek Graham of Ireland, fourth.

# Canadian Open Entry List Features World's Best

TORONTO (CP) — The 56th Canadian Open Golf Championship, with an entry list like Willy's Who of golf, received a boost Sunday when Gary Player showed up at the Mississauga Club course and declared himself ready for a shot at the title that has always eluded him.

Forced to withdraw from the British Open last week because of a neck injury, the little South African flew into Toronto Saturday night and promptly telephoned officials.

Before setting out on a usual practice round Sunday, Player said his neck is still sore but "it'll be okay tomorrow." He suffered the injury while doing some of his exercises in a bath tub.

The trouble, he said, is with a "washer," a disc between two vertebrae.

"There's still pain but this weather will loosen up the neck. I feel fine otherwise. This would be a long way to come if I weren't sure of playing."

The \$100,000 championship proper gets under way Wednesday, with a pro-amateur tournament scheduled for today at the Mississauga Course and a qualifying round at the Markland Wood course.

**SNEAD ENTERED**

Early arrivals for practice rounds also included veteran Sam Snead, who has won the Canadian Open twice.

The entry list for the Open at present stands at 253. There are 99 exemptions from qualifying. A total of 154 go into the qualifying round with 45 spots open. After the second round Thursday the starting field will be cut to 70 lows and ties.

Under the extensive exemption regulations none of the better known players on the tour will have to qualify. Among Canadian players who must undergo this test are Adrien Bigas of Montreal, winner a week ago of the Quebec Open championship, and the runnerup, Frank Whitley of Kitchener.

The pro-am lineup includes a generous assortment of highly-ranked pros, including Billy Casper, winner of the Western Open a week ago; Doug Ford, Canadian Open winner in 1963; Chi Chi Rodriguez of Puerto Rico and Bruce Crampton of Australia. Player was given a place in the pro-am immediately after his arrival.

**COURSE TIGHTENED**

The Mississauga Course has been tightened for the tournament from a par 72 to par 70. The fourth and 13th holes have been cut from par fives to fours. In addition the course has been lengthened, to 6828 yards from the normal 6420, largely by lengthening the tees.

The galleries are assured of plenty of choices to follow in the field — Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer, Tony Lama and Kel Nagle, among them. Nagle won last year at Montreal and Palmer hit his first win on the regular tour in 1955 at the Toronto Weston club.

Snead is the only three-time winner, but his last victory was in 1941. Doug Ford has won twice.

Top prize money is \$30,000, and second place is worth \$12,000.

The low profession in the pro-amateur tournament gets \$500 and the pro of the low team \$400. The total jackpot is \$5,000.

# Cycling Club Is Oldest Body

MONTREAL (CP) — The Canadian Wheelmen's Association claims to be Canada's oldest continuous sports body but is only now emerging from infancy.

That's the opinion of president Paul Eugene Roy, 36, a mild-mannered, bilingual insurance salesman, who never rode in a bike race in his life. The association is the governing body for cycling in Canada, a sport that has made a strong comeback during the last five years.

Membership in the national body is 2,500, of whom 200 are competitive riders. The others are members-at-large, most of them enthusiasts like Roy.

The association, founded in 1882 by Toronto cyclists, had a peak membership of 10,000 during the early 1900s. But interest faded in subsequent decades and the association was reduced to the status of a private club for a handful of Toronto die-hards.

Roy says the spark that ignited the comeback was the staging of a six-day indoor bike race in September, 1963, at Montreal's Paul Sauve Arena. Fans jammed the 5,000-seat arena for the entire six days and the boom was on.

But the stage for the comeback was set a lot earlier by Georges Lachance of Ste. Foy, a Quebec City suburb. His great-grandfather, a "little hot bed" of cycling, Lachance realized that it would be up to Quebec, where the interest was, to revive the national body and get the sport back on its feet.

So, in a fall of 1960, he conducted a well-organized lobby to move the association head-

quarters to Quebec from Toronto where it was "lying dormant." Lachance became national president and, in January, 1961, the headquarters were shifted to Montreal.

Roy, a vice-president at the time, replaced Lachance as president last Nov. 14. The association now has a paid secretary and publicity man, both part-time employees, and a modern, two-room office below a bank in suburban Duvernay, where Roy lives. The Duvernay mayor, another enthusiastic cycling fan, provides the office for a token \$1 a year.

"It is only now that I can say we are on the road to making a comeback in the sport," says Roy. "We have left the infancy stage, are entering the teenage stage and moving rapidly toward maturity."

A big project at the moment is the staging of the world cycling championships here in 1967, the year of the Montreal World's Fair. The International Cycling Union will rule on Canada's application in March, 1966.

Roy first developed his interest in the sport as a bicycle salesman and dealer for 10 years before he moved into the insurance field. Born in Hartford, Conn., he came to Montreal with his parents at the age of two.

He hopes for a long tenure as president "to provide continuity for the things we have planned to make cycling the No. 1 sport in Canada."

This may be a lofty goal but Roy points to statistics to show how interest in the sport is growing. He says Canadians purchased 250,000 cycles in 1964.

# New Zealand's Peter Snell Has Psychological Problem

A few months ago when Peter Snell set a world record of 3:54.1 for the mile, his coach Hal Lydiard said that was nothing. A 3:50 mile was within the grasp of the 26-year-old wonder boy from New Zealand.

Snell would do it this year because he was getting a little tired of galloping around the world's cinder paths picking up gold medals and world records. He would retire in 1966, write a book, tend to his business as public relations man for a tobacco company and let the world runners try to get under the magic 3:50 clocking.

Track experts were inclined to go along with Lydiard's prediction. Here was a chap who came out of nowhere to win the 800 metres at the 1960 Olympic Games in Rome, added two more firsts in the 800 yards and mile at the 1962 British Empire Games and soundly whipped the world in both the 800 and 1,500 metres at the Tokyo Olympics last October.

He was the "undoubted king of the half-milers and milers and even a 1000 metres" man, wrote a French lower his mile mark to 3:53.6 in a June 9 race at Rennes, France. It was almost generally conceded that Snell would soon shoot that figure down in flames.

But will he?

**HITS SLUMP**

After six straight losses in Toronto, Vancouver, London, Dublin and elsewhere, people are having grave doubts about his ability to reach the heights once more. It is ironic that the man who was shooting for a 3:50 mile a couple of months ago now is coupled to break the four-minute mark.

He just managed it in his last two races—3:59.7 in London a week ago and 3:59.9 in Dublin last Monday.

"The mere act of breaking four minutes has satisfied me," he said after his Dublin race. He said his legs were going dead on him when he was running but "it is not a physical weakness so much as a muscular one."

Possibly his current letdown can be traced back to a sunny day in Tokyo last October. He had just won his second gold medal of the Olympics, an easy victory in the 1,500 metres, after a comparative breeze in the 800.

Surrounded by reporters, he said at the time that he'd give himself another year and then quit track. There were no more worlds to conquer for this big barrel-chested black-haired great who had beaten the best with consummate ease.

Now, some track buffs are saying he has bumped into a psychological barrier.

**REST HELPS**

"The more times a champion is beaten the less chance he has of making a recovery," says a sports psychologist.
