TROUBLES MOUNT FOR NEW NATION

Moroccan Troops Occupy Areas in West Algeria

CP from AP-Reuters — The Algerian nationalist government, reeling after internal revolt and administrative chaos, announced today Royal Moroccan troops had occupied strategic areas in Algeria. The Algeria government was agency reported Moroccan troops marched into the western Sahara Thursday and occupied a military outpost 20 miles inside the border. Morocco has long claimed the area as Algeria's western desert.

The land-grabbing move by Morocco's King Hassan II came in the midst of mounting difficulties that beset this new nation. Morocco had been regarded as a friend and ally in the long struggle for independence from France, achieved three days ago. The Moroccan flag was prominently displayed by the jubilant crowds that celebrated independence for days in the streets of Algiers.

Food Rioting Is Renewed

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—Most of Brazilians were reported to have renewed attacks on food stores in the suburb of Duque de Caxias Friday and panicky merchants in Rio de Janeiro pulled down their shutters. At least 17 persons were killed Thursday in food riots in several nearby suburbs — where there apparently was no real shortage of food.

The background was a power fight between President Joao Goulart and the dominant conservative parties in congress determined to force one of their number upon him as premier.

94 Missing On Airliner

BOMBAY, India (AP)—Bombay's Santa Cruz Airport reported today that an Italian DC-8 jet airliner, due here from Bangkok, Thailand, with 94 persons aboard, was four hours overdue.

Airport control said the aircraft, an Al Italia jet, was in contact with the tower six minutes before it was scheduled to land. Two contact was lost. Heavy rain lashed the area at the time.

Grounded Ship Freed in Nfld.

MUSGRAVE HARBOR, Nfld. (CP)—The coastal ship Burgo was freed Friday night about 14 hours after running aground off Rockford Island, near the entrance of Notre Dame Bay, about six miles northeast of this northern Newfoundland coast.

Few details were available but it was known that the ship's crew combined with help from the sister ship Northern Star freed the Burgo at 10:30 p.m.

SYDNEY (CP)—A four-year-old boy was given a blood transfusion here Friday after being made a ward of the Children's Aid Society when his Jehovah's Witnesses parents refused to permit doctors to administer blood.

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American Railroads Plan To End 'Feather-Bedding'

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—J. E. Wolfe of Chicago, chief spokesman for the American railroads, said Friday the railroads planned to put labor economies into effect as soon as possible.

He noted that the railroads could not take the action until the Federal Mediation Board formally terminates its services in the dispute. Under the law, the termination would be due immediately after either side rejects an arbitration offer.
