AN INTERESTING LETTER.

MR. ATTORNEY GENERAL MCKINNON has addressed to his constituents an interesting and significant letter,—because he wants them to elect him again!

There is not a word in this letter about the application of taxes without the people's leave, or the increase of the debt to about \$600,000, or the great public improvements that have been made by the party whose legal adviser and champion he has become, or the arbitration fraud perpetrated at the last election, or the wonderful fisheries scheme, or the passage of a license law for Charlottetown, or where he was when the lights went out and the vote was taken, or the deal necessitated by the putting down of McLaughlan's foot, or the coal mine humbug at Wood Islands, or the embroglio with Mr. Walter Lowe, or the big pickings to be had of the Dominion law agency, or the summary dismissal of Rev. Donald McNeill, or the Asylum Scandal with its odors of "black" beef, and visions of dirty oatmeal, and filthy milk, and shivering lunatics, huddled together. In point of fact the Attorney-General does not attempt a defence of the Government upon its record. His appeal is based, not upon any good principle, nor upon that which is expedient in respect to the Province at large, but upon the supposition that the electors of Murray Harbor will vote for him because he, in conjunction with the Federal and the Provincial Governments will, if elected, be in a position to advance the interests of Murray Harbor. Hear him:

"We have a Liberal Government in power at Ottawa, and a Liberal Administration in power in this Province, and my view is that it is in the best interest of the Murray Harbor District that it should have a member of our Provincial Government, and should support the Liberal Party, at any rate, until the Railway has been actually constructed.

"The present Liberal Government of Prince Edward Island have agreed to contribute a sum not exceeding \$12,000 for the Bridge across the Hillsborough, to be constructed by the Dominion Government, and in connection therewith a Railway to Murray Harbor is to be built. Whatever other Districts in this Island may do, surely Murray Harbor and Belfast will approve of this."

This is clearly an appeal to the baser instincts,—the selfishness, the cupidity, the corrupt motives of the Murray Harbor and Belfast electors; and this is but a sample of the letter as a whole.

As it happens, the people of Murray Harbor have nothing to gain by electing the Attorney General and nothing to lose by electing his opponent, Mr. A. P. Prowse. The Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway will be built just as quickly if the Attorney-General should be rejected as if elected. Indeed, we may be sure that if rejected Mr. McKinnon will be all the keener to obtain the costs which he will receive as the Law Agent by whom the transfer of property along the line of railway will be made, and will therefore be the more likely to press upon the Dominion Government the expediency of prompt action in that regard.

All the same, the letter shows, in almost every line, that Mr. McKinnon has inherited from his party leaders the tendencies of a corrupt politician. There is not in it a single noble or patriotic sentiment. "Elect me,—and I and the district (not the province) will be benefited." This is his plea. The principle embodied in the Attorney-General's letter, and breathed in almost every line of it, is that according to which all the boodling transactions of the elections of 1893 and 1897 were undertaken.

and the enormous debt of \$600,000 piled up.

But there is another point to be noted. By avoiding the Provincial Government's record, and dwelling chiefly upon the good things that he may be able to obtain from the Federal Government, (if the Liberals should continue in office) Mr. McKinnon practically admits that the Provincial Government has no case upon its own merits and is quite indefensible.

ORGANISE.

Now that King's has made its nomination would it not be well for East and West Prince to get into line? The coming Conservative candidates ought to be in the field. In East Queen's Mr. Martin hardly needs the formality of a nomination—no other candidate is thought of:—and West Queen's, having come so near it at the last election, ought to find a man who will beat Sir Louis Davies at the first opportunity. Organise, then, all along the line.

FOR THE WAR.

Beginning on Friday next, six transports will leave Southampton daily. This means the despatch of over 50,000 troops in six days. A similar achievement would be beyond the power of any other European country, for the troops will carry with them everything necessary for a lengthy campaign. The war is expected to last until April, and it is expected that it will cost \$200,000,000. The Government will ask Parliament to vote immediately a credit for \$50,000,000 or \$75,000,000.

THANKSGIVING DAY.

If the delightful weather of the past ten days should be continued tomorrow, our people will have cause to be thankful for a pleasant holiday as well as for all the abundant mercies and blessings of this fruitful and prosperous year. In "every thing" we are called upon to give thanks; and we have no doubt that the duty to-morrow will be performed by a Christian people in a special manner over the broad domain of Canada.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It is announced that General Buller will be as absolute as was Wellington and less hampered than was Kitchener.

—The Australian Government has secured the White Star Line steamer Medic, now at Melbourne, to convey the Australian contingent to South Africa.

—On Sunday last Gen. Hutton attended the largest military church parade that ever took place at Vancouver. In an interview regarding the Transvaal contingent the General said he hoped to return in time to wish the volunteers Godspeed and to tell them he was sorry that he was not going too.
