Opposing Stands Taken on Missiles in W. Europe

By JOHN H. HOPKINS PARIS (Reuter) - Opposing stands on the signing of ballistic missile treaties in Western Europe were taken Friday by France and Denmark as statesmen began arriving for the NATO summit conference starting Monday.

France announced it has asked the United States for medium-range missiles and would negotiate after the summit conference on sites for them.

On the other hand, Danish Premier Hans Hansen declared upon his arrival here that in the summit conference, he will oppose stationing nuclear or rocket weapons on Danish soil.

Usually reliable quarters said the conference will have a three-point agenda as follows: 1. A question session followed by statements from the 15 heads of delegations.

2. Discussion of problems facing the alliance, including an analysis of the Soviet letters to the United Nations and NATO members.

3. Approval of the final communiqué. Two public documents are expected to emerge from the conference—the communiqué and a declaration of common purpose by the members of the alliance.

4. TO GO ON TO President Eisenhower, first American president to visit Paris for the 1919 peace conference, will make a televised speech after lunch on Monday. He is expected to be Eisenhower's first public appearance since his plane crash in 1955 impaired his speech slightly.

"With only two judges," he said, "it left a possibility that it could lead to a compromise of the law."
