Ayrshire Heifers And Cows

Average \$692 For 19 Heifers

Buyers from five provinces purchased animals at the eighth annual Sale of the Stars. Fifteen heifers and cows averaged \$692, and four heifer calves averaged \$284. The overall average head was \$606, the age at the Sale of 5.1 years, the first one in 1951 averaged \$731. This was achieved without the sale of one or two high priced sales.

Two animals sold for \$1000, William G. Bell of Ontario, purchased a 19-month-old animal for \$1000, a six-year-old cow for \$1000, excellent, consigned to Bell, Welland, Ontario. She produced 1420 lbs. 556 lbs. fat in 305 days. She had been grand champion at Ontario shows including the Ontario Champion at the SECOND HIGH award.

The second high award was consigned by Birtia breeder and was a fellow Nova Scotia cow, \$1,025. Lindwood, Ontario, year old heifer consigned to S.C. Oland, Beetham, Ontario, bought by Archie Bell of Ontario. She was a two-year-old at the Ontario Winter Fair and the Ontario Lassnessock Lass of the 1955 Sale of the Stars.
