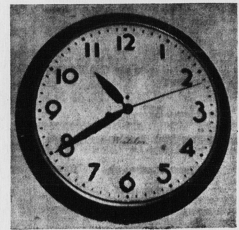
Our Todays Become Yesterdays Too Quickly
