

DODGERS HANG ON TO SLIM LEAD

Newcombe Wins 25th; Clouts Pair Of Home Runs

Don Newcombe became Brooklyn's first 25-game winner in 32 years Wednesday as the Dodgers rolled up their highest run total of the year to overwhelm St. Louis Cardinals 17-2.

The big right-hander was a one-man game as the Dodgers clubbed five Redbird hurlers for 17 hits to protect their precarious National League lead. Four home runs and four doubles were in evidence in the barrage.

Brooklyn's victory moved the Dodgers one-half game ahead of Milwaukee whose night game with Pittsburgh was rained out. Cincinnati and Philadelphia met in a doubleheader in other

National League action.
Newcombe hurled only seven innings before he was removed to rest up for the tough grind ahead. Before he left he stifled the Cards with seven hits, clouted a pair of home runs and a single to drive in three runs, stole a base and executed a fine defensive play.

New York Giants won a doubleheader from Chicago in the only other National League day game, taking the first 7-2 and the second 3-2.

Milwaukee played at Pittsburgh and Cincinnati at Philadelphia on night games.

RED SOX LOSE
In the American League, Kansas City drubbed Boston 8-1. Cleveland blanked Washington for the third straight time, 6-0, and Detroit continued its hot streak with a 9-1 win over Baltimore. The champion New York Yankees and home runs were idle.

At Brooklyn homers accounted for both Cardinal runs. Alvin Dark reached the left field seats in the first inning and Stan Musial smashed his 26th of the year over the right field screen in the sixth. Brooklyn scored in five of the first six innings, knocking out starter Tom Pohlsky in the third, then shelling Lindy McDaniel and Willard Schmidt with an eight-run assault in the fifth that represented the Dodgers' largest scoring inning of the season.

Sandy Amoros and rookie Dom Demeter hit homers for the Dodgers.

HITS GRAND SLAM
Sutcase Simpson blasted an eighth-inning grand slam home run that broke up a pitching battle between Dave Sisler and Wally Burnette as Kansas City downed Boston.

Sisler, who had pitched a four-hitter for seven innings, lost his control in the eighth, walking Burnette and Hec Lopez. An error loaded the bases with one out and set the stage for Simpson's 400-foot clout. When Hal Smith followed with a double, Rudy Minarcin came in and got Eddie Robinson before rookie Jim Pisoni all another home run.

Burnette won his fifth game against eighth losses.

Ted Williams had only one hit in four trips to slip to 355 against Mickey Mantle's 350 in the race for the American League batting crown.

NO-NO FOR LEMON
At Cleveland, Bob Lemon posted his 20th win of the season as Indians blanked Washington while a crowd of 365 shivered in the chill and rain.

The downpour stopped the game in the last of the seventh, at which time the visitors had only five

A crowd of over 1200 spectators enjoyed an action-packed wrestling card at civic stadium in Summerside last night, featuring Sky Hi-Lee Len "Cowboy" Hughes, and a tag team match with Claude Steeves and Manuel Cortez opposing Jim Bernard and Ted Germaine.

The tag team was a mixture of rather spectacular wrestling, audience baiting and general all-around buffoonery. Each side won a fall, the first one coming shortly after two of the big boys crashed into the ropes and a ring post gave way, necessitating an un-

scheduled intermission until repairs were effected. All four wrestlers were disqualified before a third fall because they were all outside the ring engaging in a warfare of words and threatening gestures.

Kenny Lane Wins Decision Over Lightburn In 10 Rounds

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Kenny Lane, 24-year-old switch hitter from Muskegon, Mich., ran his winning streak to nine fights Wednesday night as he bested Ludwig Lightburn from British Honduras in a fast 10-round bout launching Miami's new Biscayne Arena.

Lane, sixth ranking contender for the lightweight title, bothered Lightburn with his southpaw lead and befuddled him at times by going into a straightaway stance and shooting out with either hand. His blows weren't damaging but they piled up enough points to give him a unanimous decision.

Judge Sam Margolis gave Lane 100 points to 92 for Lightburn, the 22-year-old Negro who holds the ninth position in the lightweight division. Judge Jerry Sherrard voted for Lane 96-92 and referee Pety Sarron called it 99-90. The Associated Press gave Lane a 100-92 margin.

Lane weighed 137 for the na-

tionally televised fight. Lightburn came in at 138½.

NO KNOCKDOWNS
There were no knockdowns, although Lightburn slipped to the canvas twice while under heavy attack by Lane.

Lane's quick right hand shots in the jaw worried Lightburn through the first two rounds and the Michigan fighter took command in the third, when he staggered the British Negro with two consecutive combinations to the head.

By the sixth round, Lightburn's handlers were pleading with him to move in and punch but when he tried to launch a flurry Lane slowed him up with sharp rights and lefts to the jaw.

Marlene's victory came on a day that saw defending champion Pat Lesser, 1954 champion Barbara Romack and British and French open champion Margaret Wiffi-Smith eliminated.

Joanne Gunderson of Kirkland, Wash., national junior girls' champion, crushed Miss Lesser, her Seattle clubmate, 5 and 4.

Miss Smith of St. Clair, Mich., three-putted the 19th hole and bowed to Mrs. Ann Casey Johnson, who won her first tournament 15 years ago.

Demarco Debarred By NY Commission For Misconduct

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York state athletic commission Wednesday indefinitely suspended former lightweight champion Paddy DeMarco for conduct detrimental to boxing.

Commission chairman Julius Helland said DeMarco was indefinitely suspended pending decision whether proceedings will be brought to revoke his licence.

The commission also indefinitely suspended DeMarco's trainer, Joseph Buoncuro, for failing to appear at the hearing and ordered Knapp barred from all fight arenas in the state.

The commission threw out a proposed Oct. 1 bout here between DeMarco and Johnny Buaso of New York.

Fred Knorr Denies Kuenn May Be Manager Of Tigers

DETROIT (AP) — The Boston Globe said Wednesday that shortstop Harvey Kuenn will be named manager of Detroit Tigers for 1957 but Fred Knorr, who becomes president of the Tigers on Oct. 1, denied the report.

"People are just shooting in the dark," said Knorr. "There has been no decision reached and there positively will be no announcement of any kind until after Oct. 1."

Boston Globe sports editor Jerry Nason said in the story the 26-year-old Tiger shortstop will be named Sunday Sept. 30 to succeed Bucky Harris.

Kuenn told The Associated Press "I know nothing about any such offer. I have not been approached about any such job and have not given it any thought. I'm concerned about playing shortstop."

Dropped Ball Cost Braves Second Inning And Chance

NEW YORK (AP) — The Braves aren't dead, as Charley Dresen would say, but if they do succeed in this overheated National League race their demise can be traced to a rainy, dismal twilight at the Polo Grounds when they tried to commit hara-iri.

Trailing by half a game, this doubleheader with the Giants gave them a glittering opportunity to get back into a virtual tie with Brooklyn Dodgers.

The Milwaukee team was to face Johnny Antonelli, a hot pitcher right now, in the first game, but it had a pretty fair man going for it itself in Gene Conley, and with their edge in power on the Braves seemed to be no worse than an even bet.

FANS FAVOR BRAVES
To give them even more of an edge they practically were playing at home. Even loyal Giant rooters were pulling for them, as well as the contingent of Milwaukee fans.

But it's history now how the

Braves all but killed themselves as much as Antonelli beat them.

The Giants had three runs before the second inning was completed and Conley no longer was around.

The way those three runs were made is a vivid demonstration of the uncertainties of baseball.

Jackie Brandt, first man up, carried the ball off Conley's glove for an infield single. Bill White sent a roller past Conley, also good for an infield hit. Dusty Rhodes went down on strikes. Bill Sarni sent a bloop toward centre.

ONE SLIP DID IT
It should have been an easy out, but Bobby Thomson's feet began to run in one spot on the slick grass as he tried to get under way, and the ball dropped safely.

Then Daryl Spencer hit a soft line drive right at Conley's midsection. He dropped the ball for an error, and then Hank Thompson got the only real hit of the inning, a solid single to left.

That was it, one solid hit and three runs, largely because Conley couldn't fold up his six-foot eight-inch frame rapidly enough to snare ground ball #111, and because the grass was slick in centrefield.

The Braves tried to battle back, verbally and otherwise. Johnny Logan got a home run that would be a home run nowhere else in the world but the Polo Grounds in a feeble, 74-foot lopper, bugging the right field foul line to hit the screen, and Thomson unloaded a solid drive into the left field seats for another.

The verbal offense was directed, at umpire Dick Delmore, who called a drive by Antonelli over the right field roof a fair ball.

This detail of the game is just to show that when a pennant contender loses it doesn't necessarily mean it is folding under the tension. Had Conley been a shorter, more agile man that second inning might never have happened. But he isn't and he did, and that's that.
