**CITY COUNCIL.**—The regular monthly meeting last evening was attended by every member of the board. The petition of the merchants asking that the market tolls be abolished because they are detrimental to the business interests of the city was referred to the market committee to investigate and report upon at next meeting. The use of the Recorder's room was granted the city teachers for meeting purposes during certain hours on the afternoons of every second Thursday. The offer of the Gas Company to light the City Building at the rate of \$80 a year was accepted. Councillor Horne informed Councillor Nicholson that it had been arranged to have an electric light placed near St James church; and the representatives of wards one, two and three were appointed a committee to see about a re-arrangement of the lights on Hillsborough Street. A motion regarding the leasing of Spring Park field for a term of years was voted down. A resolution providing for the purchase of 500 feet of new hose for the fire department was laid on the table pending consultation with Chief Engineer Large.

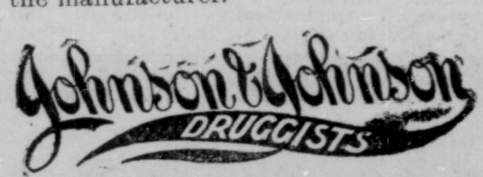

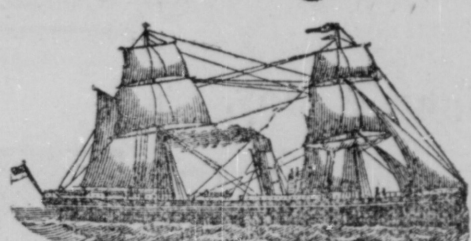
