LONDON, Feb. 8.

A violent hurricane is prevailing along the coast of most countries bordering on the North Sea. Many casualties are reported in Great Britain. A gale is blowing, accompanied, in some places, by heavy rain.

MEETING OF PARLIAMENT.

Notes From the Capital.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.

Parliament will meet on either the 8th or 10th of March.

Sir A. P. Caron addressed a large meeting of the anxious and impatient people. He said that the Government would revise the tariff on the line of the National Policy by still affording adequate protection to Canadian industries.

A Minister Prosecuted.

ST. JOHN, Feb. 8. Rev. Mr. Fuller, Methodist minister of Calais, and companion in Barrett, He is opposed to church suppers, which his church trustees favor. He locked the meeting house parlor, refusing to let the people come in. There was a struggle at the door and the pastor was carried off to the lock up. He has since been bailed out.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

BERLIN, Feb. 8.—The emperor this evening attended a grand dinner in the presence of the members of parliament, and delivered a speech. In this he announced the fact that the treaty of commerce with Russia had been signed.

TORONTO, Feb. 8.—State Insurance Commissioner Snider to-day rejected the offer of the Home Life Insurance Co. of New York, to do business in this state. The company's known business last year was \$16,000,000. It is understood that like action was taken in regard to other New York companies in Kansas. It is understood he takes this action because of the company's failure to pay taxes due to the state.

BIRMINGHAM, Ind. Feb. 8.—From a member of ex-President Harrison's family it was learned to-night that there is no foundation whatever for the rumor that he is to marry Mr. Leland Stanford.

WEXFORD, Feb. 8.—H. A. Hackett, and his son, E. R. Hackett, were arrested this afternoon. They are wanted at Farmington, Maine, on a charge of stealing between \$10,000 and \$20,000 worth of goods. They had \$10,000 worth of bonds in their possession, and were attempting to negotiate them at the city banks.

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 8.—A despatch received here from Sierra Leone announced further disturbance on the frontier of that colony between the British and French forces. A detachment of British frontier police, which was in the Solia country, had been fired upon by a force of French native troops. During the conflict one of the Frenchmen and five of the native police were killed.

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 8.—Later advice from Sierra Leone says that the detachment of frontier police which has been in conflict with the French force, is the detachment which was previously attacked by the French. The detachment, it would now appear, was returning to the coast when attacked.

BERLIN, Feb. 5.—In the Reichstag today, Herr Froebel, an actual liberal, and a well known member of the government, in regard to the Coburg succession, and suggested that the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha should renounce his British nationality. Cancellor Von Capriv, in reply declared that the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha was the lawful sovereign of the duchy, and that his sovereignty excluded all dependence upon a foreign state.
