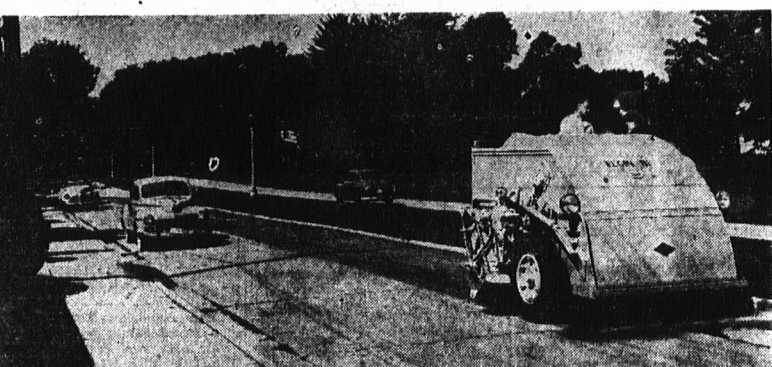

New Street Sweeper For Ch'town



Shown above is the Elgin street sweeper purchased under authority issued by the City Council at a special meeting last Monday, which is expected to arrive here in about two weeks. The gross hopper capacity of the machine is 86 cubic feet. The sweeping width is 7-1/2 feet, the main sweeping broom being 6 ft. wide, plus the overlapping side brooms. The speed of both brooms is variable for sweeping conditions. The sweeper is equipped with a water spraying system with 7 penetrating spray nozzles, including 2 oversize nozzles for side broom area. The all steel welded tank has a capacity of 170 gallons. A leaf plier attachment is expected to make the annual job of cleaning leaves easier and cheaper. With this plier, leaves are pushed into convenient piles. Level and straightway sweeping can be done economically at 5 to 8 miles per hour. A product of the Elgin Corporation, Elgin, Ill., this type of machine is in operation in more than 900 cities and towns in the United States and Canada. By the purchase of this sweeper, at a cost of \$10,419.50, the Street Committee expects to effect a saving of \$13,000 yearly and give a much more effective service and a greater coverage.

First Queens Liberal Ass'n Annual Meeting

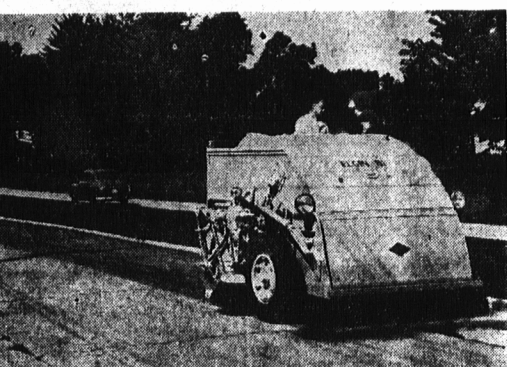

Window Display Features Driving Park Favorites



An appropriate and attractive display in the main show window of Henderson and Cudmore is causing much favourable comment from the large number of those who in passing, pause to observe and admire. A back-drop 48 x 72, artistically executed in varied appropriate colours, faithfully reproduces the Charlottetown Driving Park as seen from the Grandstand, while the base of the window is laid off true to life with a representation of the familiar half mile track, where records are made only to be broken. Placed in intervals along the "Home stretch," are cut out mounted photos of a dozen or more horses entered for the races during Old Home Week. The horses are shown in full racing regalia, with "Drivers up," and in each photograph, the horse and driver may easily be recognized by followers of the "King of Sports". First under the wire as a focal point of interest is Col. D. A. MacKinnon, Dean of Harness Racing in this Province, holding the reins over "Lassie Lucille." The familiar figure of Dr. Charles Douglas in characteristic attitude with the "Mike" at the ready for the word "GO," completes the interesting scene. Fine Record Achieved By Island Mail Courier



For over forty years, Mr. Albert Clow (shown above) has continuously carried the Government mail for free delivery to the residents in the following districts, viz. Kingston, Clyde River, Colville Road and part of New Haven. When he began carrying the mail, April 15, 1912, John Wheat was Post Master in Charlottetown. He has served under every Post Master in Charlottetown since that date. Mr. Robert Matheson's Post Office, Clyde River, is the point where the mail is received from Charlottetown for the different free delivery routes, in this section, including those served by Mr. Clow. He speaks in the highest terms of the considerate way that Mr. and Mrs. Matheson have treated himself and all other mail carriers serving in this part of the Island. Mr. Clow travels on his route a distance of twenty-four miles every day. This mileage multiplied by 308 mail delivery days in a year and then multiplied by forty, the number of years served, equals a total of 295,680 miles travelled by Mr. Clow during his long term of service. Such mileage would be equivalent to travelling around the earth about eleven times. The route referred to was gone over in all kinds of weather, fine and warm, cold and stormy. Mr. Clow has had as many as fifteen invitations every year for meals, when the roads were in poor condition. Every Christmas he has been kindly remembered by those he serves.
