

Long-Range Plans Seen Way To End Riot Problems

What really caused the Los Angeles rioting? What can be done to prevent such tragic outbreaks? A team of AP Washington reporters has been assigned to see what answers are being offered in the United States capital. The following story presents some of the solutions being proposed.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A number of officials concerned with the United States government's role in the wake of bloody rioting in Los Angeles said they believe the best way to deal with such situations is to

push long-range programs aimed at raising education and employment levels.

Congressional leaders, indicating concern over the five days of racial violence in southern California, were vague about possible steps for Congress to take that could deal specifically with the problem.

Government officials who discussed the situation with a three-man Associated Press team indicated general agreement with President Johnson's statement Sunday it is necessary "to strike at the unjust conditions from which disorder largely flows."

Leaders of the U.S. anti-poverty program are confident their efforts will bear fruit—but that it will take time.

Christopher Weeks, deputy head of the job corps, said its efforts are centered in areas such as the riot-torn south-central Los Angeles. "We want to take some of these young men who are possible centres of such foment and to re-orient them from anti-social behavior," he said.

But Weeks noted that job corps training takes from six to 18 months and that "it obviously won't have any effect this year."

Mark Battle, acting director of the Neighborhood Youth Corps, said his organization is aimed at putting youths to work in areas of high unemployment and poverty to help with local problems. "Unfortunately," Battle said, "its effect is so small."

The need for massive planning and fact-finding was pointed to by Calvin Kittle, acting director of the Community Relations Service which was established by the 1964 Civil Rights Act to ease racial tensions by co-ordinating federal, state and local efforts.

"We are not able to deal with it at the time of explosion," Kittle said of situations such as the one in Los Angeles.

"The time has really come for a national fact-finding and soul-searching, not to point the finger at Los Angeles," he said.

Said William Taylor, staff director of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission: "Our feeling for sometime is that dynamite has been building up there (in Los Angeles). It is related in large part to the lack of equal employment opportunity, bad housing, heavy unemployment, educational deprivation. These are the basic underlying problems."

U.S. Bows To Majority In UN Money Deadlock

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—The United States has announced that it will bow to the will of the majority and permit the United Nations General Assembly to resume normal operations without a confrontation over Soviet voting rights.

This article says that members two years behind in paying assessments will lose their assembly vote. The Soviet Union, France and 11 other countries were in this category.

MAY FOLLOW EXAMPLE

In explaining the U.S. decision, Goldberg made these points:

1. The U.S. still believes that Article 19 should have been applied.
2. The U.S. reserves the right to follow the example of the other delinquents and refuse to pay assessments for UN operations not acceptable to the U.S. government.

Goldberg expressed regret both at the difficulties caused by the delinquent countries and at the unwillingness of the majority to enforce Article 19.

The new U.S. policy was outlined by Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg in the 33-country committee on peacekeeping operations. In announcing the reversal of the U.S. administration's stand, Goldberg made it clear that the shift was due solely to the fact that the assembly was not prepared to enforce Article 19 of the UN charter.
