It's Like Old Times

THINGS are beginning to look like old times again in the National and American Leagues.

After weekend action was completed, Dodgers and Yankees lead rather comfortable margins in each circuit, the biggest spreads they enjoyed this season. It got folks to thinking about what will happen this coming October when the representatives go at each other in the annual world series classic.

YANKES have by far the better of the argument in what was the most competitive with the Dodgers but Flanahan will never forget that memorable afternoon in 1955 when the then-young Johnny Podeski blanked the Bombers 5-0 to win the series crown. It was Johnny's second triumph over the Yankees in that series. The Yankees are supposed to have the ball, the Davies are having the time of their lives and Maury Wills is stealing bases like a real hand.

We think it would make a great classic if the Yankees and Dodgers should wind up representing their respective leagues. They've always given world series fans the hope in entertainment and we have the idea that this year would be just a bit exceptional.

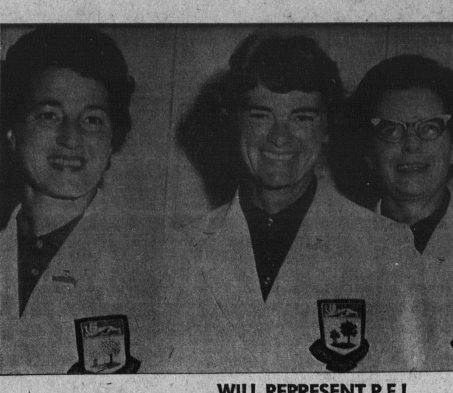
