MOSCOW, (AP)—Moscow art circles and ordinary theatregoers were shocked Tuesday to read sharp newspaper criticism both of Alla Konsantinovna Tarasova, Russia's leading dramatic actress, and the renowned Moscow Art Theatre.

But many were openly glad about the criticism. They were tired of hearing for 20 years nothing by Rev. N. Green and Mrs. Grove MacMillan were won by Mrs. Lorne MacMillan and Miss Jean MacLean.

He strongly panned the play and Tarasova's performance in particular. The male golden-eye duck is marked with a striking combination of black and white.

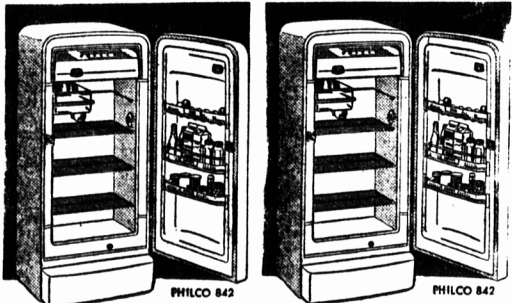

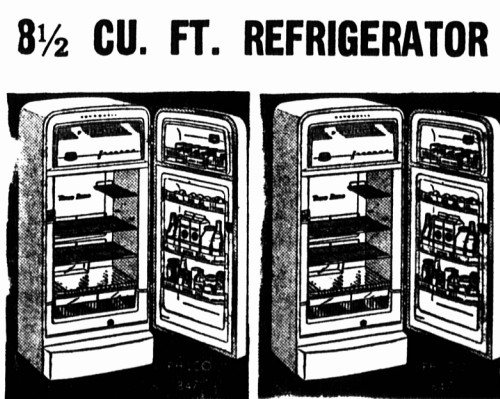

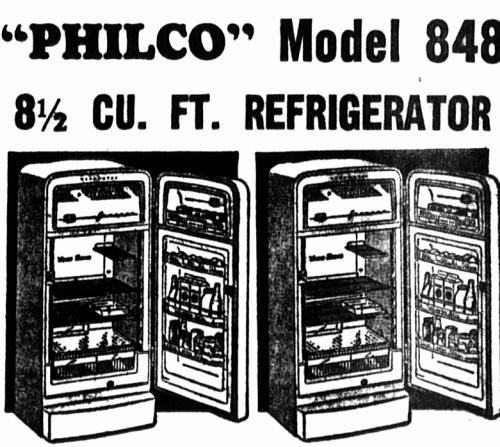
