

British Gov't Rejects Indonesian Truck Deal

LONDON (AP) — Buses for Fidel Castro's Cuba—six trucks for President Sukarno's Indonesia—no.

That's the reaction of the British government to requests from two firms that it guarantee they'll get their money for sales to Cuba and Indonesia.

Leyland Motors Sunday shipped the first part of an order of 950 single-decker buses to the Castro regime. The Cubans have an option to buy 1,500 in all.

Vauxhall Motors has signed a contract to deliver 1,600 truck chassis to the Indonesians at a cost of about \$3,000,000.

The export credit guarantee department, an arm of the government agency, has underwritten the value of the whole Leyland order, which will run to about \$40,000,000 if all 1,500 buses are bought. This means that if Castro reneges on his payments, the agency will pay Leyland.

But government authorities report the agency is refusing to insure Vauxhall's deal with Indonesia. This means the order will be cancelled unless Vauxhall can find other backers.

Free Education Draws Criticism From Committee

OTTAWA (CP)—Members of the Commons defence committee have complained that too many young men are getting a free university education from the defence department without any intention of staying in the armed forces.

The committee followed disclosure by Elgin Armstrong, deputy defence minister, that more than half of those receiving a college education from the department flunk out before graduation and that 37 per cent of the graduates serve only the obligatory three years in the armed forces.

About half the university trainees are educated at the three service colleges and the other half at civilian universities.

Mr. Armstrong indicated the defence department will announce soon that the obligatory service period after graduation will be raised to four years.

David Gross (U. — Victoria), a former naval captain, said the great majority of students whose education is paid for by the defence department are not

The export agency, which underwrote nearly \$5,000,000 worth of British overseas trade last fiscal year, pays its own way by charging premiums to the exporters who come to it for insurance. Reserves of about \$150,000,000 stand to its credit.

Douglas Harkness, former Conservative defence minister, said some graduates say openly they joined only for a free university education and have no intention of staying beyond the required three years.

He said those along for the free ride should be weeded out early and that the obligatory term of service should be five years.

Mr. Armstrong said in reply to Grant Deschman (L. — Vancouver Quadra) that the cost per graduate at a service college is \$36,000 compared with \$16,000 at a civilian university.

He said 40 per cent of graduates who join the navy leave after three years required service. He did not give the percentage for the army and RCAF.

All covenants herein contained shall run with the land and bind the premises and every part thereof into whose ownership the same may come and shall secure to the benefit of the company, as well as every person, firm, or corporation claiming by, through, or under it, title to all or any part of the lands and premises now occupied by the wholesaler and distributor of the company located on the premises to which the said lease, agreement, or other contract, obligation, or condition may be converted, to supply and service the equipment.

"That during the term hereby denied or any extension or renewal thereof, the Lessee shall conduct a retail service station on the premises, and the same shall be purchased from the Lessee or its nominee, at its or their prevailing market price and reasonable terms all the supplies of petroleum products or accessories therefor, or other products and supplies used for the purposes of furnishing power to motorized vehicles of any motor vehicles, also, accessories, batteries, tires and automotive accessories and supplies to be distributed by the Lessee or its nominee which may be required for use or sale on the premises, shall be used and any equipment or products and supplies on the premises shall be used and obtained."

Such undischarged portions and, any provisions to the effect are hereby cancelled and released from any agreement, lease or other contractual obligation to which Irving Oil Company, Limited is a party.

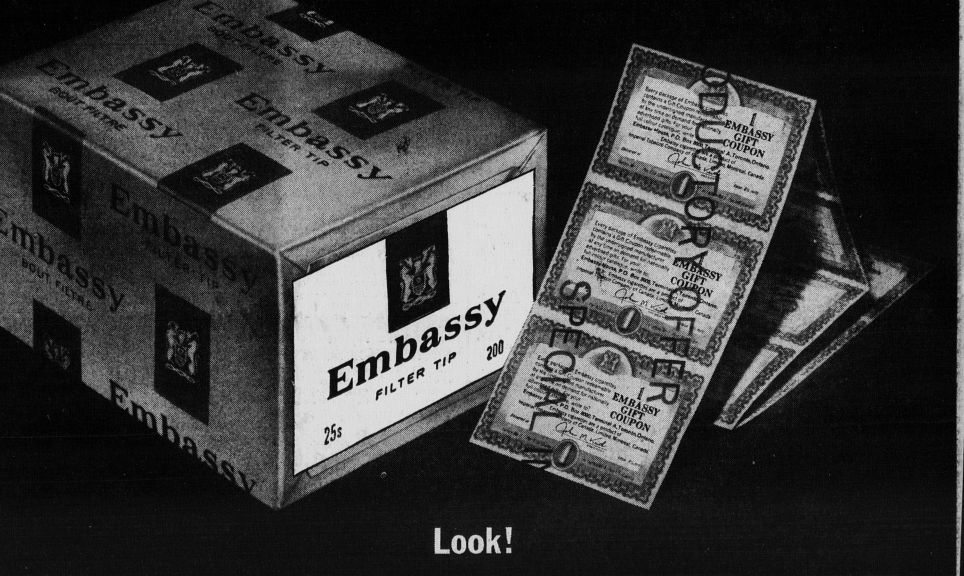
