LIVELY TIME IN COMMONS.

The Opposition Make Some Excitement

OVER AN ITEM IN THE YUKON ESTIMATES.

Mr. Martin Enquires About the Lobster Seizure.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, June 22.—In the House of Commons the Government intended to resume supply, but some time was given to discussion on a matter brought up by Mr. Davin, who read a statement of Richardson, Grit M P., and Rev. Mr. Douglas, Grit M P.; that the "cold steel of Clifford Sifton" in the interests of monopolies, had knifed the Douglas elevator bill.

Mr. Martin, of P. E. Island, and Sir Louis Davies had a discussion in reference to the seizure of lobster fishing equipment in that Province.

A tempestuous scene took place in the House after midnight. Fielding was putting through the estimates for Tarte who has started for England. On an item for cost of telegraph lines in Yukon which a party under J. B. Charleson is constructing, Fielding was asked by Wallace whether he was the same Charleson who obtained unenviable notoriety in connection with the employment of men for the Crow's Nest Pass Railway.

Fielding professed ignorance and refused to consult his deputy who was sitting beside him.

Mr. Foster told him that he could not get his item voted unless he gave information, or at least sought to obtain it. Fielding declined to be examined as to the color of Charleson's hair.

Wallace observed that Fielding was replying with his usual impertinence. The Finance Minister raised a point of order, Flint in the chair having supported him. Hon. Mr. Foster appealed against the decision.

The Opposition insisted on a recorded vote and it was two o'clock before the House got back into committee.

The Lobster Season.

RUMORED NEW FRENCH CABINET

Sensational Report About Dreyfus' Death

DEPUTIES VOTE IN FAVOR OF A PUBLIC TRIAL.

A French General Arrested—Crime Not Made Public.

PARIS, June 22.—The latest cabinet rumor is that a combination will be formed headed by M. Sanien and including M. Waldeck Rousseau, DelCase and Ribot, but there is nothing decisive settled.

Mme Dreyfus has started for Rennes. There was a wild rumor circulated yesterday that Captain Dreyfus had died on board the Stax.

Amid conflicting reports it is impossible to arrive at the truth as to the cruiser's movements.

Mr. Quesnay De Beaupaire denounces the alleged plan of the Dupuy Government to desist from the prosecution of Dreyfus so as to get the case dismissed on condition that Dreyfus secretly resigns his commission on the eve of trial and quits the country directly afterwards.

The National Defence group of Deputies met last evening and voted in favor of an entirely open and public trial.

PARIS, June 22.—General De Laroque director of artillery in the Ministry of Marine, has been placed under vigorous arrest. The offence with which he is charged has not yet been made public.

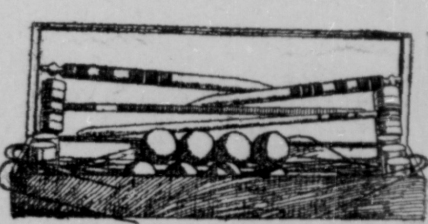
