

# Gordon's Quitting Permits Wide Cabinet Changes

OTTAWA (CP)—The resignation of Walter Gordon from the finance portfolio makes possible a major reorganization of the cabinet, in the opinion of some informed sources here.

But whether there will be sweeping changes remains in doubt. Prime Minister Pearson may appoint Trade Minister Sharp to the finance portfolio and ministers for the agriculture and mines departments and let it go at that.

Mr. Pearson said Wednesday he doesn't contemplate any cabinet changes until after the election which is expected to be held in December.

Until Mr. Gordon's resignation, he had only two posts to fill. Agriculture Minister Harry Hays and Mines Minister J. Watson MacNought were defeated Monday.

It is believed Mr. Pearson has wanted to shift one or two of his Quebec ministers but felt he couldn't do so unless there were some departures from among his Ontario ministers. This situation was made even more acute when Quebec was the only

province to return more Liberal MPs than in 1963.

**PREPARED GROUND**

In this sense, Mr. Gordon's withdrawal has opened the gates for a major cabinet shuffle.

There were reports even before the election that Privy Council President Guy Favreau would retire from politics.

At his press conference Friday, Mr. Gordon said that if a senior minister gives advice which is accepted but which doesn't work out he should offer his resignation.

Inasmuch as nearly all of Mr. Pearson's ministers, like Mr. Gordon, advised him to call the election, Mr. Gordon's remark could be interpreted as an invitation to other ministers to resign.

Mr. Gordon was asked whether Mr. Favreau, co-chairman of the Liberal election campaign, had also advised Mr. Pearson to call the election.

"I haven't seen Mr. Favreau," Mr. Gordon replied enigmatically.

He added later that Quebec, where Mr. Favreau ran the Liberal campaign, "did pretty

well." That province sent eight more Liberals to Ottawa, though he would have liked to have seen 12, he said.

If Mr. Sharp gets the finance portfolio, what will Jean Marchand and Robert Winters get if anything?

**MARCHAND FAVORED**

Mr. Marchand, a former labor leader, must be given a top portfolio. Quebec appears no longer satisfied with only one big job—justice.

There has been published speculation that Mr. Pearson might resign in favor of a caretaker prime minister until the current power struggle within the party sorts itself out and a new leader emerges.

Mr. Gordon, without being asked, said Mr. Pearson should continue in office for "many years" and that there would be "great resentment" against anyone who challenged him for the party leadership.

burned through; the bottom was intact. The horizontal stabilizer at the top of the tail section was buckled apparently the result of the hard touchdown. One jet pod was ripped off.

use of force to oust Smith and though Wilson suggested in the Commons that most of the threats of raising armies and moving against Rhodesia could be dismissed as unrealistic, he did agree the Commonwealth could be destroyed if he does not listen to member countries.

He insisted, however, that though Smith, by imposing a new constitution, was usurping the powers of the Crown, Rhodesia was still a British responsibility. It was the Labor government's aim to restore law and order and encourage conditions whereby a moderate group might replace the Smith government. Wilson gave no indication that he would support a non-white government, such as Negro nationalists were planning
