### HOUSEHOLD HINT

A thin fresh coat of clear shellac on unfinished wood will kill the sawdust odor of the wood. Dishes may be left to dry in the rack, but silver and glassware should be dried immediately to avoid spots. Wash shower curtains and other large plastics often to keep dirt from becoming embedded. Silk thread is usually best for buttoning purposes, as it pulls out easily and leaves no marks. By using a contrasting color the button stitches will be easy to locate and rip out.
