HEAVY OVERSEAS MAIL. MONTREAL (CP) — The army said Saturday its postal service this year has handled the largest shipments of Christmas mail and parcels to overseas troops since 1945. More than 70,000 pounds of mail have already been shipped to Canada's NATO brigade in Germany and two planes are taking thousands of gifts and hundreds of mail bags in Canadianes serving in the Middle East.

Landscapes By Canadian Are Treat At Local Civic Centre

The paintings on display at the Civic Centre from now till the end of the month provide Islanders with the opportunity to see more rugged landscapes than their own, as seen through the eyes of a young Canadian, Tom Thomson. The artist, who cherished his rough beauty, met his untimely end in the land he loved. Four oil paintings and twenty colour sketches in bold strokes comprise the show, loaned by the National Gallery and sponsored by the P.E.I. Art Society.

Young Thomson left his occupation as a commercial artist in Toronto to fare into Ontario's woodlands and wilderness. There he set to interpret his many moods and to capture its sometimes savage, often lonely, beauty. As a member of the original "Group of Seven" he sought to portray Canada's true personality in paint.

A gay scene of light snow in a still leafy woods, called "Snow in October", and the rocky promontory set in cool water and bathed in warm light "Petawawa Gorge" are two of these paintings. "Pine Island" with a majestic loneliness and a stark countryside "Landscape", are the other two. Some of the sketches, done quickly on birch bark, both gay and sombre, are little gems of colour.

The sketches are "Petawawa Gorge", "Spring Ice", "Artist's Hut", "River", "In the Northland", "The Lily Pond", "Petawawa", "Snow Pillars in the Sky", "In the Woods", "Canoes Lake", "Sunset", "Northern Lights", "Yellow Sky", "The Brook", "Smoke Lake", "Tea Lake Dam", "The Marsh", "Early Spring", "Ice Break-up", "Moose At Night" and "Grey Sky".

In 1917, when he was forty, Thomson was drowned in a canoeing accident in some of the country he painted. Incidentally it is interesting that a recent disclosure reveals a fresh investigation into his death. Some hold that the artist may have been a victim of foul play, though this is generally discounted. He is buried at Leith, a short distance from Owen Sound.

Death Monday Of Mrs. G. S. Munn

The death occurred at the P.E.I. Hospital on Monday, December 17, 1956, of Mrs. George S. Munn, formerly of East Royalty, in her 91st year. Mrs. Munn was born in Cherry Valley, the daughter of the late John MacEachern and his wife Charlotte Stewart. Her husband predeceased her in 1948. She is survived by several nieces and nephews.

Traffic Cases In Magistrate's Court

A Hunter River resident, charged with failing to stop at the scene of an accident, was convicted as charged, by Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet yesterday and fined \$35 and costs. A fine of \$25 and costs was levied against a Charlottetown resident convicted on his second speeding offense this year. A Bedford resident, also answering to a speeding charge, was fined \$10 and costs.

Two unlicensed drivers, one from Charlottetown and the other from Newtown Cross, were each fined \$45 and costs. The same Newtown resident was also fined \$3 and costs for allowing more than three in the cab of a truck while the vehicle was in operation.

Fines of \$5 and costs were given in the case of a Spring Park resident charged with operating a motor vehicle without licence plates, and a Charlottetown resident charged with failing to transfer registration. A similar fine was imposed in the case of a Belvedere resident charged with having defective lighting on a vehicle, while reprimands were ordered in the case of a York Point resident, also charged with defective lighting, and a Charlottetown resident charged with following another vehicle too closely, considering the speed of the vehicles.
