WHERE TROTTERS ARE CHEAP.—The annual February trotting horse sale began at Lexington Wednesday, with the disposal of 53 head for \$3,616. The feature of the sale was the low price realized for a three-year-old colt, full brother to the national stallion Prince, 2,041, owned by millionaire William Russell Allen. He brought only \$100. Clem Baehner, a Lexington trainer, was the purchaser. The highly bred stallion Time Onward, dam N. T. Time, the great brood mare, brought the top price \$360.
