Pravda Takes Issue With View Of "Comrade Tito"

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Pravda sharply reminded "comrade" Tito Friday that his own "road to socialism" had been paved with American dollars.

The Soviet Communist party newspaper took issue with the Yugoslav president on whether the "Moscow road" or the "Belgrade road" is superior.

It published a 5,000-word article in the latest round of the exchanges between Moscow and Belgrade touched off by publication of President Tito's speech of Nov. 11, which was sharply critical of Soviet policies, particularly in Eastern Europe.

Western observers here noted the relatively mild tone of the Pravda article. Its overall effect is that Tito still is a "comrade" and Yugoslavia remains in the "socialist camp." Moscow apparently does not want to open a rift with Tito or a revival of the old quarrel.

Pravda said "we are convinced that... questions in dispute must be discussed and cleared up in a calm and friendly atmosphere through a comradely exchange of opinions."

FAN CONTROVERSY
Pravda hastened to declare that the "imperialist circles" had not helped Yugoslavia "out of sympathy toward socialism," but in order to "win controversy between socialist countries by any means."

It should not be forgotten that this remained their aim, Pravda said. It noted that President Tito's Nov. 11 speech had been welcomed by "bourgeois circles" abroad.

The article was taken here as confirming the view that, under pressure of events in Eastern Europe and attacks from Yugoslavia and extreme left-wing intellectuals in the West who have hitherto been pro-Soviet, the Soviet leaders appear to be trying to close their ranks and to prevent the rifts from widening.

Engineers Studying Coal-Burning Engine

MONTREAL (CP)—An international group of engineers studied an experimental coal-burning engine at McGill University Friday.

Prof. Donald L. Mordell, who developed the machine, explained his workings to the visitors from Great Britain, the United States and South Africa as well as Canada.

Adoption of the turbine by the railways — in locomotives — would be good news for Canada's coal mining industry, he noted.

Prof. Mordell began his experiments with the engine six years ago.

"This is the first time in its history that Canada has designed and developed a prime mover," said the professor. "In comparison with other machines of this type, on which experiments have been taking place in the U.S. and other countries, we have achieved relative simplicity of design and operation."

Federal Budgetary Surplus Increases

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal budgetary surplus rose by another \$68,211,000 in October, almost quadrupling the total for the first seven months of fiscal 1956-57 to \$341,052,000 from \$91,533,000 a year ago.

Government expenditures increased by some \$50,000,000 in the month. Finance Minister Harris reported Friday. But revenues outpaced that rise, swelling by almost \$80,000,000 under a heavy flow of income tax collections, sales taxes and import duties.

Mr. Harris has been budgeting for a surplus in 1956-57 of \$113,800,000.

But despite this, the continuing heavy revenues has led to speculation that the year-end surplus may rise to \$300,000,000 or more. The October surplus of \$68,211,000 compared with one of \$40,543,000 in October last year.

October's revenues climbed to \$436,985,000 from \$359,280,000 last year, increasing the seven-month, April-October total to \$2,809,814,000 from \$2,359,687,000 a year ago.

With Canadian corporation profits and labor earnings on the rise, income tax collections increased. Heavier sales and imports brought in more taxes from these sources. Personal income tax collections increased in the month to \$135,029,000 from \$114,661,000 and in the seven months to \$811,924,000 from \$684,480,000.

With defence outlays showing the main rise, total expenditures for the month increased to \$368,774,000 from \$318,737,000, boosting the April-October total to \$2,468,762,000 from \$2,268,154,000.

Belfast Legion Aids Springhill

The sum of \$45 was voted by the Belfast Branch of the Canadian Legion to aid victims of the Springhill Mine Disaster. The donation was agreed to at the regular monthly meeting held this week in Eldon Hall, Comrade J. Vandiersteine presiding.

The meeting was honoured by a visit of Zone Commander A.C. MacEachern of the Kingston Branch and Deputy Commander Frank Rush of the Charlottetown Branch. More than twenty five members were present.

The meeting of the last meeting were read by Comrade David Ross. The treasurer's report indicated that the finances of the Branch were in good condition. Comrades MacEachern and Rush spoke briefly on the matter of forming a ladies Auxiliary.

A general discussion was followed by lunch. The visitors were given a standing invitation to attend any meeting of the Branch to be held in future.

Plan Probe Of Viking Relics

TORONTO (CP) — The Royal Ontario Museum plans to reopen its investigation of Viking relics found 26 years ago among the roots of a tree near Lake Nipigon.

The relics, known from their discovery at Beardmore, Ont., as the Beardmore relics, include an iron sword, an axe head and smaller fragments, and are reported to show that the ancient Norse explorers penetrated into central North America.

Dr. A. D. Tushingham, head of the museum's division of art and archaeology, said Friday the museum does not dispute that the objects are of ancient Viking manufacture but says since the discovery there have been repeated claims that their finding was a hoax.

The museum is troubled by the fact that there was a lapse of six years—from 1930 to 1936—between the discovery and the time that the museum was called in.

Dr. Tushingham says the story of the find is not improbable, but since the axe head and sword are used as a basis of the theory, now widely taught, that the Vikings went much farther into the continent than the Atlantic coast, he feels the whole investigation should be reopened.

Civil Damages Case In Court

The hearing of an action seeking \$500 compensation for alleged breach of duty involving the carriage and delivery of telephone equipment was commenced before Judge C. St. Clair Trainor in Queen's County Court Friday afternoon. Mr. E. Somerled Trajnor appeared on behalf of the plaintiff, the Island Telephone Co. Ltd. Mr. John P. Nicholson represented the defendant, Jenkins Transfer.

The alleged breach of duty is said to have occurred when a crate which was being hoisted to the third floor of the Telephone building slipped off the hoist to the ground. Three witnesses gave evidence before the hearing was adjourned to Thursday, December 6th, at 2:00 p.m.

Witnesses included George C. Lohes, Sydney, N.S., installation foreman with the Eastern Electrical Supply Co. of Halifax, Hector Duncan, an installation supervisor with the same company and Ralph Jenkins, proprietor of Jenkins Transfer, Charlottetown.

Report 30 Dead In Airliner Crash

PARIS (AP)—A four-engine trans Atlantic Italian airliner with 32 persons aboard crashed a d burst into flame after takeoff early today. First reports said all but two of those aboard were killed.

The airliner was en route from Rome to New York with a stop at Paris.

It crashed about two miles from Orly Airfield.

The plane was reported to be carrying 24 passengers—only two of whom boarded at Paris—and a crew of seven.

The plane made an apparently normal takeoff run in bitter cold weather.

The plane was operated by the Italian airline, L.A.I.

Timetable Of United Nations Active In Middle East Crisis

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) Following is the time chart of United Nations action in the Middle East crisis with a breakdown of votes in the Security Council and General Assembly.

SECURITY COUNCIL
Tuesday, Oct. 30: U.S. resolution calling for cease-fire vetoed by Britain and France. Seven countries voted in favor with Belgium and Australia abstaining. A similar Russian resolution also blocked by British-French veto with seven countries in favor and U.S. and Belgium abstaining.

Wednesday, Oct. 31: Yugoslav resolution calling for an emergency General Assembly session adopted 7 to 2—Britain and France against and Belgium and Australia abstaining. British proposal that the resolution was out of order rejected 6 to 4 with China abstaining. Voting with Britain were Australia, Belgium and France.

Monday, Nov. 5: Council voted against considering Russian proposal that military assistance be given to Egypt under UN article 42. The vote was 4-3-3. Russia, Yugoslavia and Iran voted for the agenda, the U.S., Britain, France and Australia were against and Belgium, Peru and Cuba abstaining.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY
Thursday, Nov. 1: Vote on U.S. resolution calling for cease-fire and recommending that all members refrain from introducing military goods into war area adopted 64 to 5 with 12 abstentions. Britain, France, Israel, Australia and New Zealand against with Canada, Belgium, Laos, Holland, Portugal and South Africa abstaining. Luxembourg was absent.
