

Jeering on Are Deflected By Keeler

LONDON (Reuters) — Christine Keeler, whose love affair with a war minister almost brought down the British government, defied jeering crowds Friday after a brief court appearance on conspiracy and perjury charges.

The 25-year-old self-styled model smiled confidently at whistling and boating onlookers crowding the sidewalk outside a London court which earlier had released her on £3,000 (\$9,000) bail pending a hearing next week to set a trial date.

"She deserves prison," a grey-haired woman remarked loudly as Miss Keeler climbed into a black limousine with three other persons charged with her in the case of Jamaican jazz singer Aloysius (Lucky) Gordon.

Miss Keeler, long red hair blowing defiantly in the rain, arrived earlier at the court to shouts of "good luck Christine" from another waiting crowd after spending a night in jail.

The playgirl, arrested Thursday night on charges of lying to police about an alleged assault on her by Gordon, was a

key figure in the scandal triggered by her love affair with former war minister John Profumo.

After a five-minute formal hearing, the case against Miss Keeler and the three others was adjourned until Sept. 13. Scotland Yard Detective Supt. James Axon, the only witness, said prosecution had no objection to bail being granted.

Released with her were Paula Hamilton - Marshall, 20, with whom Miss Keeler shares an apartment; Mrs. Olive Brooker, their housekeeper; and Jamaican Rudolf Fenton.

Miss Hamilton - Marshall and Mrs. Brooker were arrested Thursday night and Fenton was arrested Friday morning.

Axon said he expected the trial to take three days and the magistrate adjourned the hearing for a week to set a trial date. Axon suggested Sept. 23 or Sept. 30 as acceptable dates.

Miss Keeler and the two other women were charged with perjury and conspiracy to obstruct justice in connection with Gordon's case while Fenton was charged only with conspiracy.

Civil Service French Sector Is Suggested At Conference

OTTAWA (CP)—The carving out of sectors of the federal civil service to work basically in French was proposed here today at a conference of senior Canadian public administrators.

The idea came from Gilles Lalonde, professor of international relations at the University of Montreal. He was one of four men leading a panel discussion of bilingualism at the annual conference of the Institute of Public Administration of Canada.

Professor Lalonde, an external affairs department foreign service officer from 1954 until last year, argued that his proposal would attract French Canadians to jobs in the federal civil service.

It would provide them with "decent careers" working primarily in their own language and culture, side by side with larger, unilingual-English sectors of the public service.

He said bilingualism in the sense of encouraging more civil servants to become fluent in both languages was an unattainable and unnecessary objective.

servants in Ottawa accept the ideal that all officials at headquarters should be bilingual.

He proposed among other things a clear-cut policy by the federal government requiring a majority of key officials in every department have a reasonable degree of fluency in both languages.

He urged a massive, government-financed program to teach government employees a second language and establishment of a minimum level of bilingualism whereby correspondence is answered directly in the same language and face-to-face service is rendered in either language.

Guy Doros, professor of government at the University of Ottawa, suggested that no promotions take place beyond a certain level without knowledge of both languages and that the federal government finance language courses starting at the intermediate level for rapid teaching of French and English.

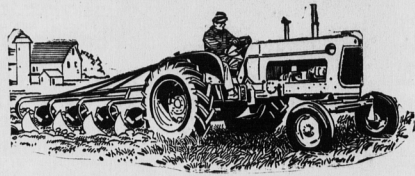
