Italian Gov't Likely To Get Confidence Vote

ROME. (Reuters)—Premier Giuseppe Fella, presenting his pro-western government to Parliament Wednesday said Italy will continue her strong support of the Atlantic Pact and moves towards European unity.
The new premier also announced an amnesty for political prisoners but did not give details.
He said the internal policy of his government will be governed by a stable money policy and vigorous promotion of big development projects already under way in the poverty-stricken areas of the south.
Reaction of the two Chambers of Parliament to Fella's brief statement of policy indicated that the government will survive the vote of confidence due this week-end.

Successful Field Day Yesterday At Knutsford

—A very interesting and informative illustration field day, sponsored by the Dept. of Agriculture, was held yesterday afternoon on the farm of Robert Woodside and Son, Knutsford, near O'Leary. Mr. Norman Black, supervisor of illustrations stations for Prince Edward Island occupied the chair and introduced the speaker. Despite cloudy skies and rain during the late afternoon there was a good attendance.

Mr. F. M. Cannon, entomologist of the Science Service Lab., Charlottetown, addressed the meeting regarding the various types of insects that infest Island crops and advised what can be done to control them, mentioning a number of experiments which the department is now carrying out in the search for new chemicals to destroy these insects.

Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture was the next speaker to address the gathering greatly praising the Department of Agriculture for the excellent job they are doing with their numerous experiments. Mr. Baker criticized Island farmers for the overplanting of potatoes and stated that moderate planting would greatly help prices. Regarding the loss of overseas markets he said that the greatly increased cost of production prohibited sale of farm products except in the dollar areas.

Crop Development Is Reported Satisfactory

OTTAWA. (CP)—Warm weather in the last fortnight has promoted rapid development of crops through the prairie provinces. The Bureau of Statistics reported Wednesday in a summary of its eighth telegraphic crop report.
"As a result of these favorable weather conditions," the bureau said, "crops in many areas will reach maturity earlier than previously expected."

"Yield prospects are still generally excellent," the report said, "despite considerable local damage from flooding and hail. Some rust damage has occurred and is still a threat, particularly to late-sown crops in Manitoba and Saskatchewan."

N.B. Teacher Shortage Worse Than Last Year

FREDERICTON. (CP)—Education Minister Taylor said Wednesday New Brunswick's teacher shortage is worse than last year. In 1952 the province had to increase 611 high school students as temporary teachers to keep schools open.
Rural schools are hardest hit, he said, but one consolidated high school can't find a principal. However, most city and town schools are fully staffed.

Sheep Creek Mine Reports Loss

VANCOUVER. (CP)—A net loss of \$107,972 resulted from operations of Sheep Creek Gold Mines Limited, during the year ended May 31 compared with a net profit of \$51,254 the previous year. Working capital declined to \$454,154 from \$898,516.

S'side Firm Gets Contract At N. B. Army Camp

—A telegram received yesterday by the well known Island contractors, Messrs. Morrison and MacRae, Summerside, announced the acceptance of their tender to clear and grub two of the seventeen sections at Gagetown Army Camp, New Brunswick. Both these sections are in the tank driving area.

It is understood that work will begin immediately, the necessary machinery and equipment will be transferred to the scene of operations at once and it is estimated that work on this project would continue until next spring at least. The area to be cleared and grub is about 500 acres.

At present this firm is engaged in another contract about 70 miles from Camp Gagetown where they are screening, washing and crushing a hundred thousand yards of gravel for the C.N.R. railway at Boisseton, N. B.
