No. Carolina Father Suicides After Killing Six Children

CLINTON, N. C. (AP)—Officers seeking to serve a warrant on a tenant farmer Tuesday peered through windows of his home and saw the battered and butchered bodies of his six children aged 2 to 10 sprawled about two rooms. Four hours later police bloodhounds baying along a nearby cowpath led officers to the father's body, beside which lay his .410 gauge shotgun.

The dogs guided a posse of state and local officers to the body of Rufus A. King, 34, at a point in a woods only 200 yards from the humble dwelling.

The warrant charged King with beating his wife. She had left home Monday night after a quarrel, officers said, and spent the night with a brother at Clinton, an eastern North Carolina farming centre some 60 miles southeast of Raleigh.

TWO-YEAR-OLD SHOT
Neighbors saw some of the older children playing in their yard just before time for the school bus to arrive. When the school bus arrived, the driver tooted the horn,

waited a bit, then drove on without the King children.
Deputy Sheriff Ira Hatch theorized the children were slain between 7 and 8 a. m.
Sampson County coroner Coleman Carter said two-year-old Susan King was shot as she lay in her bed. He said the others apparently were huddled to death with the butt of a rifle or an axe. They had compound fractures of the head.

"It was the most horrible sight I have ever seen," Carter said. More than 100 persons joined state highway patrolmen, sheriff's deputies and Clinton police in combing the woods for King. The bloodhounds, brought from a state prison camp near Elizabethtown, sniffed him out in about 10 minutes.

King was shot through the eyes. He lay on his back in a cowpath near a swamp.

Coroner Carter listed the children, in addition to Susan, as Alice Gray, 10; Joseph Allen, 9; Melvin, 7; Ruth, 5 and Jerry, 4. Their bodies were sprawled in the kitchen, in doorways and near a bedroom fireplace.

Lumber Operators Add Voices To Freight Boost Protests

OTTAWA (CP)—Opposition to the railways' request for a 15-per-cent general rail freight rate increase came today from lumber operators on both coasts and Saskatchewan farm interests.

Lumber associations in British Columbia and the Maritimes asked the board of transport commissioners for special consideration to their shipments in event of a further increase. The Saskatchewan Wheat Pool recommended that the 15-per-cent freight rate boost sought by the railways not be granted.

Colin Mackay of Saint John, N.B., chairman of the Maritime Lumber Bureau's transportation committee, said lumber shippers in the Atlantic provinces have had to absorb a more substantial part of rising transportation costs than their competitors in the central Canada market.

Maritime producers had to sell about 90,000,000 board feet of their lumber in the Ontario-Quebec market annually. Their stiffest competition came from lumber operators in those provinces, where competition for freight traffic held rates down more than in the Atlantic provinces.

Between 1948 and this year lump-

ber freight rates had increased faster for Maritime shippers than those in Quebec and Ontario.
For example, said Mr. Mackay, in 1948 the rate from Val d'Or, Que., to Toronto was the same as from Truro, N.S., to Toronto. By last July, the Val d'Or-Toronto rate had risen 23.88 per cent while the Truro-Toronto charge was up 78.32 per cent.

MONCTON (CP)—Suspended Alderman Lloyd E. Keating is scheduled to appear in court here Tuesday on five charges of using telegrams to convey false information.

Mr. Keating, pleading not guilty to the charges here Aug. 1, elected trial by magistrate because "I wish to be tried forthwith."

The charges were laid by five city aldermen who reported receiving telegrams urging them to oppose construction of a super-market in the city's north end. The telegrams were allegedly from local organizations.

The city council earlier unanimously adopted a resolution suspending Mr. Keating from the duties and relieving him of his duties as police committee chairman "until conviction or acquittal."
