Hockey School Starting Friday

Everything is in readiness for the annual hockey school for players, coaches and officials this Friday and Saturday in Charlottesville.

This annual get-together is sponsored by the division physical education and recreation division of Prince Edward Island in cooperation with the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association.

Eddie Powers, former National Hockey League referee, will act as chief instructor for the two-day session. Powers is scheduled to arrive in Charlottesville Thursday evening from his home in Toronto.

The sessions will commence Friday morning, December 13, at 9.30 with registration at Charlottesville. The registration period will continue until 10.30 when brief introductions will be made before Mr. Powers swings into action at 10.45 with a 60 minute session on refereeing techniques and a discussion period.

Friday afternoon Dave Boswell, provincial director of physical education, will hold his first class at 2 o'clock on coaching (fundamental skills). At 3.30 Mr. Powers will return to action with a period on conditioning and practice. In the evening, Mr. Powers will continue with discussions on rules and rule interpretation.

Saturday morning, the sessions will again begin at the 'Y' at 9.30 and the chief instructor will have another 'go' at refereeing. A coaching session will follow at 11 o'clock with Mr. Powers' 'Bucko' Trainer in charge. St. Dunstan's varsity coach, Jack Kane, will handle the 2 o'clock defensive coaching. Jack will look after offense.

At 3.30 Saturday afternoon, there will be a practical session at the Forum and all 'pupils' are asked to bring along their skates and sticks. Eddie Powers will be in charge of this session.

The two-day school will continue with a dinner at the Charlottesville Hotel and a presentation by David Evenden. Presiding will be Mr. M. Boswell.

President Campbells Fines Players After Wild Brawl

MONTREAL (CP)—The wild brawl in last Saturday night's National Hockey League game in Toronto between Chicago Black Hawks and Toronto Maple Leafs has produced a total of \$50 in automatic fines for 28 players.

What other fines are to be levied, if any, will be up to NHL president Clarence Campbell after he completes an investigation of the affair. He also has the power to order suspensions if he sees fit.

A compilation today at NHL offices showed that highest individual contributors in automatic fines are Reg Fleming and Murray Hillman of the Leafs and Bobby Baun of the Hawks—\$75 each.

Larry Hillman of the Leafs and Chico Maki of the Hawks are assessed \$50 each.

16 to other all will pay \$25 each.

The wild outbreak—at 16:37 of the last period—brought about seven major penalties, six misconduct penalties and three game misconduct penalties. Eleven players of each club were tagged with automatic \$25 fines for leaving the bench and becoming involved in an altercation. Chicago Cubs Nellie Fox Trade With White Sox

CHICAGO (AP)—Nellie Fox, long-time Chicago White Sox second baseman, was traded to the Houston Colts for two farm hands Tuesday.

Technically, the peppery Fox—who will be 38 on Christmas Day and reportedly drew a \$42,500 salary last season—was sold to Houston. The White Sox, in turn, purchased pitcher Jim Golden and outfielder Dan Murphy, \$100,000.
