U. S. Interests Oppose Gas Deal With Canada

WASHINGTON (AP) — U. S. coal, labor and rail interests have asked the federal power commission to refuse permission for an exchange of natural gas between the United States and Canada.

Joining in the motion are the National Coal Association, United Mine Workers, Fuels Research Council, Inc., Anthracite Institute, Western States Fuel Policy Council, Maher Coal Bureau and the Cheapeake and Ohio Railway Co.

At issue are applications of Midwestern Gas Transmission Co., Tennessee Gas Transmission Co., Iron Ranges Natural Gas Co., and Central Wisconsin Gas Co., to take Ltd. near Noyes, Minn., and Emerson, Minn., and to sell U. S. gas to Trans-Canada at the border near Niagara Falls for resale in Montreal.
