Black Hawks Looking Good

Coach Billy Reay of the Chicago Black Hawks must be sporting a wide grin today as his club sits atop the National Hockey League standings with a 4-0 record, one point ahead of the Habs. However, they have a game in hand, they mauled the Canadiens, 6-4, Saturday night and they have yet to play on home ice so Reay has plenty of reason to be happy.

The Hawks' victory in the Forum that gave them undisputed possession of first place must have been rather gratifying for the Black Hawk mentor as his club spotted the Canadiens to a 4-2 lead at the end of the first period but stormed back to pot four unanswered tally's. The teams swapped power play goals in the first 2 1/2 minutes but Berenson and Bellevue snapped in two quick ones to give the Habs a 3-1 lead with only ten minutes gone. Hull dented the twines for his first marker of the evening shortly after but Cournoyer struck 22 seconds later for his second tally of the evening.

The Hawks started to play the Habs game in the second period as they utilized the power play to advantage and Wharmen recorded his fourth marker of the young season. Nesterenko, Hull and Mikita rounded out the scoring for the Hawks and brought the clubs goal total to 21 in four games. Of this total Hull has eight, Wharmen four, Mohns five.

These five goals of Mohns are quite a surprise to most observers for he is not generally known as a heavy scorer. Hull with eight tallies and three assists has an inside track to the record of fifty goals in a season and also the scoring record of 96 points held by Dickey Moore. Conceivably all three of these Hawks could eclipse the 50 goal record because all three are averaging a goal a game now. However don't count on it....

TORONTO (CP)—The sudden death Eastern Football Conference semi-final between Ottawa Rough Riders and Montreal Alouettes will be played Saturday, Nov. 6, in Ottawa with kickoff time at 2 p.m. EST (3 p.m. AST).

The winner will meet Hamilton Tiger-Cats, first place finishers, Sunday, Nov. 14 in the first of a two-game, total-point series. It will be played in Montreal or Ottawa at 2 p.m. EST (3 p.m. AST).

The second game will be played in Hamilton Saturday, Nov. 20. The game will start at 1 p.m. EST (2 p.m. AST). If a Western Conference playoff is being played the same day. If the Western finals finish in two games, the EFC game will start at 2 p.m. EST (3 p.m. AST).

The CBC has not announced television coverage of the games. The privately-owned CTV network will carry the semi-final and the second game of the final.

Defending Champ Terrell Retains Heavyweight Title

TORONTO (CP)—Ernie Terrell retained his World Boxing Association heavyweight championship Monday night with a unanimous decision over George Chuvalo in their 15-round title bout.

Terrell, the 206-pound champion from Chicago, used a lightning left jab from long range to pile up points against Chuvalo, the 209-pound Canadian heavyweight champion from Toronto.

Chuvalo, five inches shorter than the champion, was unable to get under Terrell's long-range blows to score effectively. Terrell had a five-inch advantage in reach and height over the stocky Canadian and used it to perfection to pile up and early lead with his left jabs to the head.

Chuvalo tried repeatedly to get in close and score to the body, but Terrell danced around and even when the Canadian was able to get in close the champ tied him up effectively.

Terrell opened quickly, flicking a succession of lefts into the face of Chuvalo and by the second round had the challenger's nose bleeding.

USED BEST WEAPON The left was Terrell's best weapon and he used it to keep the always stalking Chuvalo at bay and piled up points with it.

In the later rounds when both fighters began to tire, Terrell was able to back-pedal and retain his margin.

The champion raised a well under Chuvalo's right eye in the seventh round and in the 14th opened a cut above the challenger's right eye.

None of this seemed to bother Chuvalo as he kept going in after Terrell.

Referee Sammy Luftspring of Toronto, the Canadian welterweight champion in the early 1930s, scored the bout 72-65 favor of the six-foot-six Terrell.

Judge Fred Norbert of Toronto had it 73-65 in the champion's favor and judge Billy Burke, also Toronto, made it 69-64 for Terrell.

AWARD POINTS The fight was counted on the five-point must system in which the winner of each round was awarded five points and the loser four or less.

The defence was the first for Terrell since he won the WBA version of the heavyweight title March 5 with a decision over Eddie Machen.

The victory left him with a record of 38 wins and four losses. He has won 18 by knockout.

The loss was the 10th against 33 wins and two draws for the 26-year-old Chuvalo, who has never been knocked off his feet.

Terrell, the 26-year-old member from a family of 10 children, will collect either a guaranteed \$45,000 or 35 per cent of the live gate at Maple Leaf Gardens; same of the fight. Chuvalo's cut is either \$45,000 or 25 per cent of the live gate, whichever is greater.

SHARE TV TAKE In addition, the fighters will share in the proceeds from closed circuit and cable television. The closed-circuit TV was shown in 25 centres in Canada and 14 in the United States, including pay TV in Hartford, Conn.

The fight also was shown on cable television in five western Canadian centres.

Terrell didn't let Chuvalo land a solid blow until late in the second round when the Canadian connected with a pair of sharp rights to the jaw. But neither did any serious damage.

Terrell scored with a solid right of his own straight into Chuvalo's face in the third round after setting him up with three rapid lefts to the face.

Chuvalo landed a couple of good lefts late in the fourth round, but they came too late to put Terrell in any trouble.

By the fifth round Chuvalo was throwing wild punches in an effort to knock the champion off guard, but to no avail. The challenger scored with two hard rights to the body and face, then landed a hard right to the jaw at the bell.

Terrell and Chuvalo mixed it up in the sixth as the fight showed signs of developing into a brawl, but Terrell moved back to long-range boxing in the seventh.

In the eighth, Luftspring stopped the bout and made two warnings, one to each fighter.

The first was to Terrell whose thumb, he said, "was doing a lot of damage."

Then, he said, Chuvalo retaliated by butting and drew a warning.

Chuvalo was disqualified here by Luftspring in March, 1961, for butting in a bout against Joe Erskine.

The crowd of 12,500, which paid \$124,456.50, was left wondering what was going on in the eighth.

The gate was off the Canadian record of \$148,500 in 1956 for an outdoor bout in Toronto between Archie Moore, light-heavyweight champion, against James J. Parker of Barrie, Ont. Moore won easily before a crowd of 19,832.

Chuvalo nailed Terrell with a hard overhand right early in the ninth but the champion danced away out of trouble quickly. The American eluded Chuvalo and that and continued to score well from a distance through the 10th.

THREW WILD LEFTS Both lighters were visibly tired by the 11th, in which Chuvalo got in close frequently only to be tied by the clinging champion. Chuvalo again reverted to throwing wild roundhouse lefts, hoping to connect with the big one. But the champion backed out of range or ducked under the blows.

The fighters exchanged blows through the 12th and 13th, and in the 14th Chuvalo missed Terrell and glanced a blow off referee Luftspring's face—but it was a harmless blow.

Chuvalo, desperate by the 15th, belted Terrell with a hard, looping right to the jaw that had the Chicagoan in trouble briefly. But Terrell survived and was out of difficulty at the final bell.

Come-From Behinds Cop 2 Championships

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Two come-from-behind performances marked the completion of the regular Eastern Football Conference schedule.

Don Sutherland of Hamilton Tiger-Cats kicked 14 points in the last game of the season Sunday against Toronto Argonauts to overtake Moe Racine of Ottawa Roughriders for the individual scoring championship.

In rushing, Toronto's Dave Thelen ran 129 yards in the game against Hamilton to take that championship with 806 yards. He went into the game 62 yards behind Jim Dillard of Ottawa, who finished with 730 yards.

Sutherland's output for the season was 82 points, on 19 converts, 19 field goals and six singles. He went into Sunday's game seven points behind Racine and kicked three field goals, three singles and two converts.

Three other Hamilton players took individual championships: INTERCEPTED NINE Billy Wayne intercepted nine touch-downs, three more than Ottawa's Bob O'Boilovich, and four more than teammate Garney Henley.

Joe Zuger, an alternate Hamilton quarterback, kicked 1335 times during the season for an average of 44.5 yards. Close behind was Dave Mann of the Argos, with 123 kicks and a 42.2 average.

Garney Henley returned 66 punts for 557 yards, well ahead of Montreal Alouettes' Ed Leary who carried 69 times for 579 yards.

In passing, Russ Jackson, Ottawa quarterback, finished first. He threw 130 completions for 18 touch-downs and had 13 intercepted.

Terry Evenshen, a rookie star with the Alouettes, caught 37 passes during the season for 631 yards in three touch-downs. He finished ahead of Ottawa's Ted Watkins, who snared 34 passes for 723 yards and eight touch-downs. The title is decided by the number of passes caught.

In kickoff returns, Dick Shatto ran back 14 for 374 yards to lead. Bob Scott of Ottawa returned 13 for 361 yards and one touch-down. Another Ottawa player, Gene Gaines, ran back 20 kickoffs but for only 357 yards.
