Fishermen are getting gear and supplies ready and soon the plant will be making things ready for the biggest season ever, where many thousands of dollars will change hands every week. It's a big industry now.

Gone forever are the old blacksmith shops where half a dozen smithies were busy. J.B. Jay, retired now, can tell you of his days along with three brothers and his father. They staved all day long and far into the evening winter and summer.
