CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.
NORTH: A 10 4, K 7 5, J 8 7 6 3, K 5
WEST: Q 9 5 3, Q 9 6 2, A, J 7 4 3
EAST: J 7 6 2, 10 8 4, 9 4, A Q 8 2
SOUTH: K Q, K J 3, K Q 10 5 2, 10 9 6
The bidding: South West North East 1 Pass 3 Pass 3 NT
Opening lead—two of hearts.
From a team of four match comes this hand which has its points of interest.
The building at both tables was identical. It would seem that both Norths should have jumped to two notrump rather than three diamonds. It is true that a two of trump response ordinarily shows 13 to 15 high card points, but the advantage of identifying immediately a notrump type of hand should outweigh the importance of telling partner about the diamond support.
At both tables a heart was led. The first declarer played low from dummy and won East's ten with the jack. The king of diamonds then forced West's ace. West realized declarer had hearts

Divers Work On Plane Wreckage

WINNIPEG (CP)—Divers worked Monday to free two bodies from the half-submerged wreck of an RCAF helicopter that crashed into the ice of Lake Winnipeg Sunday, killing all six persons aboard.
The 14-passenger Sikorsky H-34 was returning from a night-time mercy flight to the Bloodvein Indian reserve, 150 miles north of here, where it picked up an Indian woman and her two-year-old daughter, injured when their log cabin home burned Saturday.
Killed when the aircraft crashed 90 miles north of here were: Mrs. Jacob Crate and her daughter; Flt.-Lt. J. C. Smith, 28, Swan River, Man., pilot; Dr. B. L. van den Berg, 32, of the Indian affairs department hospital at Pine Falls, Man., and crew members Cpl. W. J. Bain, 34, Dauphin, Man., and LAC J. W. Wotherspoon, 37, of Yorkton, Sask.
FOUR BODIES IN PLANE
Four bodies, including that of the child, were found on the ice outside the wreckage. Identity of the two trapped inside was not immediately available.
An RCAF spokesman said the helicopter had been almost exactly on course when it crashed, eight miles north of Manitogogan, 100 yards from shore.
The aircraft left on the night flight to the Indian reserve about 11 p.m. Saturday, picking up Dr. van den Berg at Pine Falls en route.
An air force spokesman said the type of aircraft has only a basic instrument panel and generally relies on landmarks for navigation. He said the helicopter was dispatched because of the reported critical condition of the mother and child.
SPOTTED IN AFTERNOON
The demolished helicopter was spotted by one of two RCAF

search planes Sunday afternoon. RCAF officials said cause of the crash is under investigation. It was possible the craft was forced down by a snowstorm that passed through the area early Sunday.
Three para-rescue men were returning to the site. They reported no survivors and stayed the night.
Flt.-Lt. Smith, a veteran helicopter pilot, won publicity in April, 1954, when he rescued a steeplejack from the top of a 100-foot smokestack in Saint John, N.B., after the man was stranded by a broken ladder.

Britain Pays Wartime Loan

LONDON (Reuters)—Derrick Heathcoat Amory, chancellor of the exchequer, has thanked Canada for an interest-free \$700,000,000 war-time loan, the treasury announced Monday.
In a message to Finance Minister Fleming, the chancellor said:
" We value most warmly the spirit of friendship and co-operation to which this loan bears witness, and which was demonstrated again most recently under your chairmanship at the Commonwealth trade and economic conference in Montreal two months ago."
The British high commissioner to Canada, Sir Saville Garner, earlier presented a cheque for \$7,500,000 to Canada's finance minister, the final payment on the loan.
Britain borrowed the money in 1942 to buy Canadian goods for prosecution of the war.

Soviets Reveal Research Plans

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union has announced a seven-year scientific research program ranging from harnessing hydrogen energy to prolonging the life of man and his capacity for work.
Prof. Alexander Nesmeyanov, president of the Soviet Academy of Science, outlined the program to Russia's 270,000 scientific workers—giving top priority to "solving problems of controlled thermonuclear reactions."
Biologists, he said, will tackle the cancer problem from the angle of biophysics, biochemistry and the "structural basis of fundamental life processes."
