Soviet-Backed - 400-mile border from Liebeck on the Baltic to Hof in Bavaria. The ditch-digging brigades on the Soviet side of the zonal border beyond the Elbe River gave a serious touch to the growing conviction the Reds regard the national split as final.

This was East Germany's immediate answer to the Bonn Republic signing of an alliance with the Allies through the West German peace contract and the European army treaty. It translated into action the Communist threat to make their zone sovereign and to make isolated West Berlin pay for its independent, anti-Communist attitude.

Disruption of intercity telephone lines in Berlin prompted the Western Allied commandants to meet in emergency session and there were signs some new representations would be made to the Russians.

with anger. The Literary Digest printed a telephone dispatch from Berlin suggesting that the German people one day would place West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer on trial for signing the Bonn agreement.

The signing of the agreements does not mean that the European defence community has come into existence yet. A hard fight awaits it in the parliaments of the member countries and it may be many months before Germany begins recruiting the 400,000 men who will make up the German contribution to the European army.

During the ceremony in the French Foreign Ministry's ornate Clocq room today, western statesmen affixed 406 signatures to nine documents concerning the structure of Western Europe's defence and co-operation. It took 35 minutes.

R.C.A.F. Recruiting Officer Makes Tour Of Selection Centres

A member of the R. C. A. F. Recruiting Unit at Summerside, P. E. I., F/L A. Gustien DFC, has recently completed a tour of the R. C. A. F. Selection Centres across Canada. He reports he was impressed with the modern selection procedure and care taken in ensuring the proper utilization of aircrew and groundcrew recruits.

The Personnel Selection Unit for Officers is located at London, Ontario, and is geared to select and assess Aircrew applicants into one of three trades, Pilot, Navigator or Radio Officer, depending on the skills and aptitudes shown by the individuals. It is also organized to select potential Technical, Medical and Administrative Officers and ensures their ability to lead and command as well as being adept at their professional trades.

One of the more interesting features at the Officer's Selection Unit was found to be a series of practical problems which are required to be solved on a team basis. A leader is selected to coordinate the solution and the problem is then outlined. A typical problem was the crossing of an assumed mine-field where the only equipment involved was two unevenly spaced upright boards, encompassing the mine-field, and a series of boards of different lengths. These boards eventually could not be easily fitted across the upright boards, and it was very enlightening to see the amount of imagination, initiative and ingenuity displayed by the various groups in solving the problem.

Located in Quebec - The Personnel Selection Unit for Airmen and Airwomen is located at St. Johns, P.Q., and is geared for the reception and procession of large intakes of recruits. Great stress is placed here on individual selection and selection, and ultimately the recruits are placed in trades indicated by their aptitudes and previous skills. The recreational facilities at this Unit were found to be many and varied and allowed for great scope in individual preference and tastes. The catering facilities and meals supplied are of the highest order and comprise the latest features in balanced diet.

In the routine inspection of the facilities provided at this Selection Unit, F/L Gustien was accompanied by S/L R. S. Davis, the Chief Training Officer, who demonstrated the vast amount of organization required to process and select the large intakes that arrive each week. He was also able to inter- view three recruits from the Prince Edward Island area, all in various stages of the selection procedure. AW2 Bernice McLaughlin of Bear River, P. E. I., on being contacted, stated she was very happy in her new surroundings and is looking forward to the future with great anticipation. LAC Pius Cheverie of Souris, P. E. I. and LAC R. J. MacDonald of St. Peter's, P. E. I. both voiced the same opinion, and were greatly impressed by the well-organized manner in which their activities were being conducted. If proper selection is the basis of a sound organization, the results being demonstrated at the Selection Units across Canada augur well for the future of the rapidly expanding ranks of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Callbeck, manager of the Fur Marketing Department of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association, called upon for remarks, said that the fur situation seemed a bit brighter. He quoted from a statement in Women's Wear Daily and other sources which mentioned that there was a scarcity of certain types of raw furs, and Mr. Callbeck said that this may direct attention to silver fox. The world's supply at present, he said, is comparatively small. The production in Canada this year is not expected to be much more than 40,000 and it is doubtful if the United States will produce that many silver fox and mutation pelts.

However, there are still quite a large number in storage in Canada and the United States but the grand total would be much smaller than the average consumption of silver fox a few years ago. He said a fur as beautiful as silver fox surely cannot be expected to drop right out of the market.

Fine Reproductions - Mr. D. O. Stewart, who is largely responsible for the activities of the Fur Advertising Committee, passed around some beautiful reproductions of photographs taken of models wearing pearl platinum capes. All those who saw them thought they were the best they had ever viewed. Mr. Stewart said that this year a great many furs had been made up in silver fox and mink garments for display at the International Exhibition and he would like to have had all our fox and mink ranchers see them but that was not possible at the season they were shipped.

Mention was made of the annual meeting of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association which will be held at the head office of the Association in Summerside on June 10th commencing at 10:00 a.m. It is hoped that as many members as possible of this Association will be present.

Canada's Exports Of Animals Decline - OTTAWA, May 27 (CP)—Canada's exports of animals and animal products declined by \$39,000,000 during the first four months of 1952, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The decline was attributed mostly to foot-and-mouth disease, resulting in the United States embargo on Canadian cattle and meat.

Exports during April declined to \$15,133,000 from \$25,143,000 in April last year and in the four-month period dropped to \$71,432,000 from \$110,508,000.

There were no cattle shipments during April, compared with \$6,900,000 worth last year and in the four-month period exports declined to \$4,069,000 from \$25,459,000.

Exports of meats, including smoked and cured, dropped to a mere \$956,000 during the month from \$4,548,000 and in the four months slipped to \$7,755,000 from \$13,952,000.

Foot-and-mouth disease in Canada was announced Feb. 25 last and the U.S. clamped on its embargo immediately.

Probe Possibility Body That Of Missing Gaspé Man

No identification has as yet been made of the body of a man found at Black Banks on Friday, May 23rd. Reports have been received of two men missing at Gaspé and as full a description as possible was forwarded to authorities there. Owing to the decomposed condition of the body and the fact that the head was missing the only definite clue to identity is the leather top gum boot and a seaman's hat found nearby.

It was the opinion of the jury which was empanelled by Coroner Dr. W. A. Shea, Alberton, that the man would have been about six feet tall and have weighed about 190 pounds. A description has been circulated to all R.C.M.P. and police detachments in the hopes of identifying the corpse.

Until such identification has been made the remains have been interred in a close coffin in the common graveyard at O'Leary.

Miscouche Study Group
