

PROROGATION OF THE LEGISLATURE.

On Saturday last, at half past Two o'clock, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor came down to the Council Chamber...

- An Act to prevent the going at large within the town of Charlottetown of Horses, Bulls, Cows, and other neat Cattle.
An Act to regulate the publishing of Notices and Advertisements relating to the Public Service.

An Act to regulate the manner of proceeding upon controverted Elections of Members to serve in the General Assembly.

An Act to further amend the Laws for making Lands and Tenements liable for the payment of Debts, and for other purposes.

An Act to consolidate and extend the provisions of the Laws now in force relating to the Fire Engine Companies of Charlottetown.

An Act for regulating the size and quality of Fish Barrels and Tierces, and the Inspection of Pickled Fish.

An Act for the better preventing accidents by Fire, within Charlottetown.

An Act to consolidate and amend the Acts relating to Merchant Seamen.

On presenting the Money Bills, the Hon. the Speaker of the House of Assembly addressed His Excellency as follows:—

May it please your Excellency;

The House of Assembly have given their serious consideration to the many important measures brought under their notice by Your Excellency's Speech at the opening of the Session; and I have the satisfaction to acquaint Your Excellency, that Bills for the encouragement of Education, of Agriculture, and of the Fisheries, which it is hoped are calculated to give an additional impetus to our trade and enterprise, have been so far matured as only to require Your Excellency's assent to become law.

The Legislative Council and House of Assembly have failed to agree on any plan for settling the Fishery Reserve question; and the House of Assembly, believing that a speedy and final determination of this difficult and important measure would greatly conduce to the interest of this Colony, trust that Your Excellency will call the particular attention of Her Majesty's Government to this subject, so as to enable the Legislature, at its next Session, to found an enactment thereon.

The House of Assembly having cheerfully voted to Her Majesty such Supplies for the Public Service as the pecuniary resources at their disposal would warrant, and from such sources as would be least burthensome and oppressive to the inhabitants of this Island, whom they represent, have sincerely to regret, that their liberal intentions towards Her Most Gracious Majesty should have been rendered, in part, ineffectual, by the Legislative Council's having intercepted an aid granted on all spirituous liquors distilled or manufactured in this Colony. The means of preventing a similar occurrence may not prove unworthy of Your Excellency's consideration.

I have now the honor to present, in the name, and on the behalf of Her Majesty's faithful and loyal Commons of this Island, several Bills of aid, which have been granted to Her Majesty during the present Session, and to pray Your Excellency's assent thereto:

An Act for the encouragement of the Seal and Cod Fishery.

An Act relating to Schools and Education.

An Act relating to Treasury Warrants.

An Act to establish a Reward for the destruction of Bears and Loup-cerviers.

An Act to alter the Act relating to Statute Labor.

An Act for the regulation of the Public Wharf of Georgetown, and other Wharfs.

An Act to alter the Act authorizing the erection of an Asylum for Insane Persons.

An Act for raising a Fund for the encouragement of Agriculture, to be expended in the erection of Lime Kilns and the burning of Lime.

An Act to provide Salaries for Sub-Collectors of Customs, at the several Out-Ports therein mentioned.

An Act imposing duties for raising a Revenue.

An Act for appropriating certain monies therein mentioned, for the service of the year 1844.

After assenting to which, His Excellency was pleased to close the Session with the following Speech:

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

Although circumstances obliged me to call the Legislature together at a much earlier period than usual, yet, by your ready adoption of a wise and just course, I was enabled, in a few days after, to relieve you from further attendance, by adjournment, until the season usually set apart for the transaction of Legislative business had arrived; since which time, I trust that your zealous exertions have completed many measures calculated, under Providence, to enhance the prosperity of the Colony; and I hope that in returning to your homes you will carry with you the approbation of our august and excellent Sovereign, as well as the gratitude of the people for whom you legislate.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I offer you my acknowledgments for the supplies which you have voted for the exigencies of Her Majesty's Government in this Colony. They will be applied with care and fidelity. To an important diminution in the outlay, you have united an expenditure apparently calculated to advance the interests of the community.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

Be assured that I shall employ the interval of time which will elapse before I shall again meet you, in earnestly endeavouring to carry out the objects you have deemed it expedient to encourage, and otherwise to forward whatever may seem advantageous to the prosperity of this Island, in which pursuit I am confident of receiving your zealous support, far as we may be separated.

THE CURRENCY.—It is rumoured that the Legislative Council have refused to sanction the Bill recently passed by the Assembly for altering the Currency, unless some amendments are made in it. During the present week, the alterations proposed by the Bill have been very generally adopted, and British Shillings have passed for 1s 2d, although some of our heavy Merchants connected with the shipping interest have continued to take British Gold and Silver at the former value; there appears, however, to be a fixed determination on the part of the Shopkeepers to receive British Coin at the rate of 24s. to the Pound Sterling, whether the Legislature sanction the Bill or not. We are much in want of a settled currency, and consequently much inconvenience is felt by our Merchants and Traders in the present state of the question, a circumstance which cannot fail to be perceived by our Legislators, and should call for their immediate co-operation.

MARCH 26.—The Currency Question.—We are happy to state, that this question is in a fair way of being settled by the Legislature, and in a way that will prove most beneficial to the community. The amendments proposed by the Legislative Council have been rejected by the Assembly, and a new

Bill, in exact accordance with Lord Stanley's despatch, has been introduced by the House, and passed its first and second readings.

MISSIONS.

To have "the mind which also was in Christ," is a duty and privilege expressly enjoined upon all his disciples—and to feel that we are, by the Spirit of God, inclined to love and inculcate those precepts which the blessed Saviour has commended, is to the truly Christian man a source of inexpressible satisfaction. The last great Commission given by Jesus Christ to his disciples, just before he was taken up to that place which must receive him "till the times of the restitution of all things," runs thus—"Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature—he that believeth shall be saved." This, then, is the genius of Christianity, to be ever moving about the earth, proclaiming to men of all grades and conditions, ranks and classes, "Salvation by Faith in Jesus Christ our Lord." These remarks are called forth, at this time, from the circumstance of the Annual Meetings of the Wesleyan Missionary Society in this place having just terminated; and it will be gratifying to "all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity," to be informed that they have been attended with unprecedented success. The Meetings at Lot 49, Little York, and Cornwall, having been held at a time when the inhabitants were busily engaged in finishing their winter's work, were not so well attended as could have been wished; still, notwithstanding these disadvantages, upwards of Thirty Pounds have been already contributed, and in all probability this sum will be considerably increased. Considering the great depression of the times, this is certainly a large amount. The Meetings held during the past week in Charlottetown have been of a character calculated to gladden the hearts of all who take an interest in this great work. After the preaching of the Anniversary Sermon, on Sunday evening last, by the Rev. J. B. Strong, the collection amounted to £16 10s. 9d. On Tuesday evening, the Annual Missionary Meeting took place—Charles Binns, sen., Esq., in the chair. The Chapel was filled to overflowing, and on this occasion collections were taken up to the amount of £66 10s. 9d., exclusive of the Sunday Scholars' Missionary Box, containing £4 6s. 7d., and Miss Strong's Missionary Box, worth £1 12s. 3d., making in all the sum of £85 8s. 0d! The circumstance of the children of the Sunday School having, by contributing their pence, during the past year, realised so considerable a sum, is truly gratifying; and the zeal which "these little ones" have manifested is worthy of imitation; but while we rejoice in all these things, let us not forget to whom the praise belongs—and say, "To God be all the glory!"—Amen.—Communicated.

To the Merchants of Charlottetown, and all others connected in trade throughout the Island.

GENTLEMEN:—An attempt, I find, is speedily to be made, by some injudicious person or persons, to reduce the nominal value of our currency to the Halifax standard. If this is done, in its present condition, the consequences will be ruinous to the Island; and we may as well shut up our shops at once, as business, in the event of such a reduction, must, of necessity be seriously checked in all its channels. The British silver, even at its present rate, is rapidly disappearing—equalize it with the currency of Nova Scotia, and you will afford still greater facilities of sending it away; and in a few months you will not see a single shilling in circulation. The experiment has been already tried, and the result was nearly fatal to the Island. What may be the object, in advocating such a measure, I am at a loss to know. A person, by originating and promoting public companies, may have some personal advantage in view—such as the brokery or pecuniary management of the Company to be created; but here we cannot fancy that a single individual can be benefited; but, on the contrary, that the whole community must suffer. Oppose the measure, Gentlemen, in its outset, and I promise to afford you, in a few days, sufficient reasons for its vigorous and total rejection.

LIME.—Much has lately been said, and much, it appears to us, remains to be said, with reference to the applicability of Lime, as a manure, to the soil of this Island. In another column our readers will find some remarks by the editor of the Toronto Cultivator, which we recommend to the attention of our Agricultural readers. The Legislature of this Colony have passed a Bill providing for the erection of Lime Kilns and the burning of Lime, in order that that useful article may be supplied to those who need it at as cheap a rate as possible. This Bill now awaits the Royal Assent to become Law, and will, we doubt not—if assented to—prove of very essential benefit to our Agriculturists generally.

The Committee of the Central Agricultural Society, aware of the general interest existing in the community, respecting the supplies of red Clover Seed, expected to arrive here next Spring, take this means of communicating to the public that by the last mails, the following intelligence has been received. The Boston supply consists of 3 hds. weighing 2637 lbs. now safely stored in Halifax, and in readiness for shipment the first vessel for Charlottetown, on the opening of the navigation in the Spring. The March mails from England, brings a letter from the Society's correspondent in London, of the 21st March, stating that the Society's order for a supply of red Clover Seed, shall have every possible attention and purpose shipping it by the Constance, which vessel was up for sailing some days prior to any other.—Id

On Tuesday last, at about three o'clock the Barn of Mr. Benjamin Roper, of the back Royal Road, was destroyed by Fire, containing some Wheat, some unthrashed Oats, and several articles of tacking, &c. Mr. Roper himself has been unable from illness to leave his house for some time past, except on crutches, and Mrs. Roper asserts that neither her children nor any person belonging to the house, had taken lights in or near the premises for some time previous. This is the third time

their barn has been burnt, and twice under suspicious circumstances. As it is believed that this diabolical depredation has been the act of an incendiary, it behoves every person in the community who respects the laws, to use every exertion to ferret out so feindish a character, and if reward will bring to light the perpetrator, offer such a sum as will have the desired effect.

LAUNCHED.—At St. Peter's Bay, on Saturday the 23d inst., from the shipyard of Messrs. MacInnis, a handsome little Schooner of the burden of 40 tons, called the Experiment. By the united strength of 22 horses, she was hauled the distance of 7 1/2 miles, thirty chains of which were over bare ground. In consequence of a large crack in the ice, over which they intended to haul her, having given way on her approaching it, she immediately broke through, on which the horses in draft had to be cut away from her with the greatest despatch possible. She is now floating safely in her destined element. She is owned by Capt. Angus Macdonald, St. Peter's, and is intended for the Seal Fishery. We wish the enterprising owner every success in his Experiment.

LAUNCHED.—On the 3d inst., from the shipyard of Mr. Dougal McIsaac, St. Peter's Bay, a Schooner of about 100 tons burthen, called "The Repeater." She was hauled for a distance of nearly 200 yards on the ice, and belongs to Mr. Horatio Webster, Charlottetown.—Pal.

In every relation of social life he acquired and preserved the respect and esteem of all, and of him it may with truth be said, that few men have gone to the tomb more universally beloved and regretted. He has left a wife and numerous family to deplore the loss of an attached and tender husband and father.
