BOARD OF TRADE.—A Board of Trade has been organized at Pictou. Mr. H. H. Hamilton is president, and Mr. Charles W. Ives, secretary.

**NEW QUARTERS.**—The Merchants Bank of Halifax, at Truro, will move into their new building in the course of a few days. The building is the finest, devoted to commerce, in the town, and is a great credit to Truro.

**THANKSGIVING DAY** was generally observed in Charlottetown. The public offices, stores and other places of business were closed throughout the day, and the special services in the various churches were well attended.

**BACHELORS' BALL.**—The event of this week in Truro was the bachelor's ball. About two hundred guests were present in the hall of the splendid new building of the Merchants Bank of Halifax. The affair is described as "a howling success."

**HOCKEY.**—The Prince of Wales College Hockey Club has been re-organized for the season with the following officers: L. N. Pickard, President; L. J. Miller, Vice-President; M. Mollison, Secy-Treas. Executive Committee, Chas. Farquharson, Wm. Holman and Leslie Adams.

**A GREAT YIELD.**—Last spring Mr. J. H. Gunning, of Coverdale, sent 5 lb. of seal-foot potatoes by mail to his daughter in Ellensburg, Washington State. The other day he received word that from these five pounds the yield had been 296 lbs.—Moncton Times.

**THE ESTIMATES RECEIVED.**—Chairman Hunt, of the Summerside Town Council, has received from Prof. Lee an estimate of the cost of waterworks and sewerage for that town. The estimate for the waterworks system is \$72,000, and for the sewerage \$30,000. The report and detailed plans have not yet been received.

**A CENTENARIAN.**—Mrs. Edward Taylor, of Afton, Antigonish County, N. S. celebrated her one hundredth birthday on Sunday, November 14th. Mrs. Taylor was born in Guysboro County, Nova Scotia. About fifty of her children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren called on her on Sunday. She possesses all her faculties, though her sight is slightly impaired.

**KINDERGARTEN HALL.**—The social in Kindergarten Hall last evening, under the auspices of the Ladies Aid Society of the First Methodist Church, was a success in every respect. The attendance was very large, and all had a good time. A choice literary and musical programme added to the success of the entertainment. The fruit and candy and other tables were well patronized.

**OBITUARY.**

The death of Christina C. Stewart, wife of Rev. A. A. McLeod, occurred at Belle River, November 16. Because of her failing health Mr. and Mrs. McLeod were compelled to return from the mission field in October, 1896. Rest of nearly a year in California failed to restore health, and in July last they returned to their native home. Mr. McLeod's mission station is at Ramachandrapuram, India, under the Canadian Baptist Mission Board. Here Mrs. McLeod rendered great assistance in the work among the women and later as superintendent of the boarding school at the station. Being possessed of excellent teaching ability, rare self-reliance and strong attractive christian character, she proved an excellent helpmate for her husband. In the seven years of their labour in India, they were instrumental in building up three churches of four hundred members. These churches they were not permitted to see self-sustaining before furlough, as they confidently expected. Unwillingly, Mrs. McLeod surrendered her work, remaining at her post even after the Board advised her return. Her life was thus given to the work of her Master. Having no children of her own, her time was more completely at the disposal of others. In so short a period of time few lives are permitted to see such fruits of their toil.

Mrs. McLeod was the daughter of Mrs. Mary M. Stewart, of Belle River, and was favourably known in different Island communities as a public school teacher. Her remains were interred at Belfast, the Rev. J. C. Spurr, assisted by Revs. Stewart and Sinclair, conducting the services.
