The Charlottetown Engineers are requested to meet at the Drill Shed on Monday evening to select detachment for the Guard of Honour.

The Vice Regal party is expected in Summerside about noon on Wednesday. They will be met at the railway station by Richard Hunt, Esq., and a committee representing the town council and the county. Their Excellencies will probably visit the Laves school, in which it is proposed to mass all the school children. After this there will be luncheon at the Clifton. Space in the dining room being limited, the number of tickets issued will not be more than forty. After luncheon the distinguished visitors will be driven to the Town Hall, where an address of welcome will be presented by Mr. Hunt on behalf of the City Council and the County, and an address will be presented by Lady Aberdeen by the W. C. T. U. After the addresses are replied to an informal reception will be held at which all who desire will be presented to their Excellencies. After the reception their Excellencies will embark on the Acadia for Point Du Chene. It is expected that the other cruisers of the Canadian fleet will be in Summerside and escort the Acadia from the harbor.
