

The MV Confederation made an extra trip last evening as the heaviest traffic to date in the season was transported across Northumberland Strait. The CNR dispatcher in Charlottetown reported last evening that a total of 1,120 motor vehicles were transported yesterday, the largest number for the weekend holiday. There were 638 vehicles taken to the mainland while 486 vehicles came to the island. A total of 3,216 vehicles were transported over the holiday weekend and 770 on Friday, 770 on Saturday and 523 on Sunday. It was reported that the traffic was extremely heavy at Wood Islands, however correct traffic figures were not available last night.

# Power Blackout Cause Unknown

# Back-Benchers Seeking Wide-Ranging Legislation

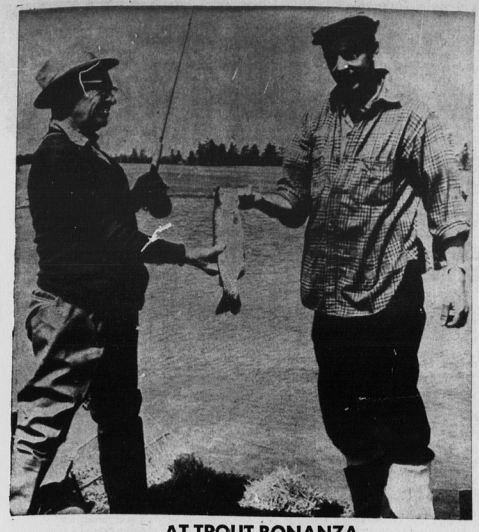
