Island Senator Suggests Federal Tourist Dept.

OTTAWA — Canada should have a separate department of tourism, Senator F. Elsie Iman suggested in a speech in the Senate Wednesday. The Island senator pointed out the tremendous value of the tourist industry to Canada but said that world wide competition for the tourist dollar was becoming keener all the time.

"If Canada is to meet this competition successfully, we must put forth every effort to sell the Canada story."

I would strongly urge the government to give early consideration to a department of tourism, Senator Iman said.

MONTREAL (CP) — Twenty-one members of a terrorist group called the Front de Liberation Quebecois were held criminally responsible Wednesday for the death by dynamite explosion of an arm y night watchman last April 20.

The late-night time-bomb blast was one of a series of terrorist activities in the Montreal area from March 8 when gasoline bottles were flung at Montreal armories and May 20 when an army recruiting station in
