CINCINNATI (AP) — Manager Walter Alston of Los Angeles Dodgers followed custom Saturday and named all the second-choice players in playing balloting to help fill out the National League roster for the annual All-Star baseball game.

In addition to the second choice, Alston picked catcher Smoky Burgess of Pittsburgh and outfielder Johnny Callison of Philadelphia.

The pitchers for both the National and American League teams will be announced Thursday.

Those who finished second in the player balloting and who were named by Alston to the all-star squad included:

Catcher Johnny Edwards of Cincinnati, first baseman Bill White of St. Louis, second baseman Bill Mazeroski of Pittsburgh, third baseman in a Rowen Cato of Chicago, shortstop Leo Cardenas of Cincinnati, left fielder Willie Mays of Atlanta, center fielder Mike Flood of St. Louis and right fielder Hank Aaron of Milwaukee.

Favorite Sweeps To Win In Irish Sweeps Derby

DUBLIN (AP) — Santa Claus, the 4-to-7 favorite, proved as good as his name Saturday as he surged to the front with three-sixteenths of a mile to go and won the third running of the Irish Derby, sixty-thousand Irishmen roared.

The boy son of Chamossaire, Aunt Clara stamped himself as the best three-year-old thoroughbred in Europe with the addition of this victory to his Epsom Derby triumph, scored earlier in the month at Epsom Downs.

The race carried the hopes of millions of people through- out the world who had bought Irish Sweepstakes tickets. A ticket on the winner was worth \$140,000.

Just as he did in the Epsom Derby, Santa Claus trailed far back during the early part of the 1 1/2-mile race. Then he started moving through the field of 18 rivals.

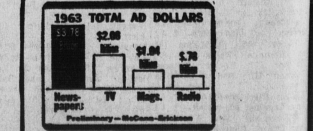
