The National Magazine for April has been received, and is a superb Easter number from frontispiece to final tail piece. It opens with Eben E. Rexford's latest story entitled "Forever, If Need," handsomely illustrated with drawings. By far the two most timely and pertinent articles of the issue are: "The Diplomatic Situation at Washington," by Walter Wellman, the widely known correspondent, and "Our Coast Defense" by Winsloe Bates. There is a vast deal of new matter in both of these, at present, absorbing subjects. "The Tramp's Ocean Route," by Withrops Packard, is a novel and humorous illustrated sketch describing how walking gentry, take their European tours. Another rather clever article showing the humorous side of tourists' experience in our American Riviera is entitled "I through Florida With My Fool Self" by Freeman Furbush. Two very readable bits of Easter fiction are Winthrop Packard's "The Hobby Goblins as Easter Angels," and Louise Crockett Henderson's "A Trio of Easter E, isodes," both being fully illustrated with drawings. A new presentation of the midland woman as the fusion of all that is best in her northern and southern sisters, is given in Jane Long Boulden's "A Study of Midland Types," the text being supplemented by a large number of beautiful photographs. An extremely appreciative article on "Whitman, Man and Poet," is written by one of his literary executors, Dr. R. M. Bucke. NEW TYPE OF BATTLESHIPS.—It is pointed out in recent despatch from London that the keel of the formidable battleship, has been laid down at Portsmouth Dockyard. Hitherto it has been customary to build up the keel on the blocks on which the vessel is constructed, but in this case the whole of the keel line was put together and hauled over to the blocks which formerly constituted the beginning of the ship. The formidable, which is the first of her class, is to be 400 ft. in length, 75 ft. in beam, and will have a mean draught of 26 ft. 9 in., less draught than the Majestic class. She will have a displacement of 15,000 tons, a speed of 18 knots, and will be armed similarly to the Majestic class. She is to be rapidly advanced during the ensuing financial year when more than £400,000 will be expended on her.
