Island Operators Report Vacancies

Tourist operators on Prince Edward Island will most likely be the first people in the province to feel the economic strains from the Borden-Cape Tormentine ferry strike.

Tourist operators in the province have been enjoying what was probably the best season in the tourist industry on P.E.I. and the number of visitors to the province was up 20 per cent from last year to date.

A number of operators reported last night that visitors to the province started leaving early Thursday and by Thursday night many hotels in the province were less than 50 per cent full. Cancellations were coming in all day yesterday.

One operator said that people who were planning to spend next week in the province would cancel their plans knowing the difficulty entailed in getting off the island, and that children have to register for school a week from Monday.

A proprietor of a North Shore resort said yesterday that the Cavendish area was very quiet in comparison with the situation that has existed from mid June.

It was learned yesterday that some summer resort operators are planning on closing up for the season, rather than stay open and try to operate at a loss.

Director of the Confederation Centre, Bob Dubberly reported that theatre tickets refunds were running triple the usual numbers. "The last week of summer production is going to be hit pretty hard if the rail strike ties up the ferries," he stated.

Closing Plays Are Scheduled

The final two performances of the professional theatre group at Kings Theatre, Georgetown, will be given tonight when The Typists and The Tiger bring the Summer stock season to a close.

Director of the plays, Walter Massey, noted drama adjudicator, said recently it had been a "wonderful experience" to be part of the opening of a new Canadian legitimate theatre. Mr. Massey had been seen during the earlier summer season in two other plays which he also directed, Under the Yum Yum Tree and The Marriage Go Round.

On stage tonight for the closing performances will be Tudi Wiggins and Marc Strange in The Typists, with Mr. Strange and Anne Butler appearing in The Tiger.

Centennial Project Officer Meets With Local Officials

Provincial and Municipal officials attended a briefing yesterday at Confederation Centre at which detailed explanations of the Centennial Commission's Confederation Train and Caravans project were given by Project Officer Leslie J. Maiden. Here Mr. Maiden (LEFT) shows a scale model of the Train and one of the Caravan sites to Lorne Monkley, deputy provincial secretary. The project is designed to present the history of Canada as a living and moving experience. Prince Edward Island will host the Train and the Atlantic region Caravan in 1967.

The Centennial Commission's project officer for the Confederation Trains and Caravans Leslie J. Maiden met with provincial and municipal officials at Confederation Centre yesterday to familiarize these officials with the administrative, technical and promotional aspects of this major Centennial project. Each Prince Edward Island community receiving the Train or Caravan was represented and heard at the session which outlined the entire publicity and advertising campaign on both national and regional levels.

The aim of the Confederation Train, which will be in Charlottetown October 20, 21, 22 and 23, 1967 and in Summerside October 24, 1967, is to recreate Canada's history and also visualize the future of the country. Six cars of the fifteen-car Train will present Canada from stone age to space age, a unique sight and sound experience which makes use of sound, light, door, and multi-dimensional visual exhibits to tell Canada's story.

The Train, a national project will begin its run on January 1, 1967 and will travel from Victoria, B.C. to the Maritimes during Centennial year, returning to Montreal on December 5.

The Caravans, eight in number are a regional project. They will tour from May 1 to November 14, 1967 and are expected to be the major Centennial event around which local Centennial planning will develop. The Caravan on site will be like a small fair. Eight tractor trailers "Canada on wheels" will tell the same story as the Train, internally making use of models, photos and walk-through reconstruction, but the external area of the Caravan will tell the story of the region's history. An exhibition stage at the disposal of local groups is a feature of the Caravans.

Caravan no. 1 will tour the four Atlantic provinces visiting Murray River, Montague, Souris, Morell, North Rustico, Kensington, O'Leary, Wellington, a nd Borden in this province. These will be one-day stops starting June 30 in Murray River and ending on July 10 at Borden with the exception of the North Rustico show which will run July 5 and 6.

The Centennial Committee were hosts at a luncheon for Mr. Maiden and his staff at noon yesterday. A nine-to-five agenda for the liaison meeting was condensed by transportation difficulties and the group left the province at four o'clock yesterday.
