Caseload Sentences Granted Five Persons

SUMMERSIDE — A Toronto man, John Wilfred Martin, was given a two-years' suspended sentence, Nov. 5. The sentence was imposed by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court Saturday morning.

In addition to the sentence, Martin signed a recognizance of \$1,000 with two sureties of \$500 each on condition that he keep the peace and be of good behaviour for the period of the suspended sentence.

Magistrate MacDonald noted that of the seven cases of whiskey stolen in the break, only half had been recovered, and when accused was asked he stated that he did not know where the remainder was.

The accused who came from Ontario about a month ago and has spent the past 17 days in Prince County Jail having previously pleaded not guilty, was also ordered by the magistrate to leave the province within 72 hours.

Second accused in the case, Major Joseph Gaudet, Tighish, pleaded guilty to the charge, Nov. 14 in court at Alberton. He was given a one-year suspended sentence, Canada's first recognition of \$1,000 with two sureties of \$500 each on condition that he keep the peace and be of good behaviour for the period of the one-year period.

Defence counsel was J. Watson MacNaught, CQ, while John L. Holmes represented the Crown.

Five Alberton youths, Charles Driver Powers, Ivor Gary Arthur

Shields, 16; Gerald Edward Arsenault, 18; Winston Franklin Fraser, 19; and Fedonard David Barrett, 19, were all given a suspended sentence of two years, having pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering the dwelling house of Robert Foley, South Killdare and committing an indictable offence therein. In addition, Powers, Arsenault and Shields each pleaded guilty to a charge of stealing a sum of money, less than \$50 and also stealing a movie camera.

Plus the two-year suspended sentence, Barrett also received a 30-day jail term in Prince County Jail. He was considered the ringleader.

Several of the boys were ordered to leave the province.

4 Members Inducted By Lions Club At 5 Side

SUMMERSIDE — "I have never seen a Lion's club better than yours", said Ralph Casley, Riverview, N.B., as he spoke Saturday night at the annual charter night banquet of the Summerside Lions Club at the George R. Peakes, V.G. Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion.

Mr. Casley, a charter member of the Summerside Lions Club, now residing in Riverview, N.B. He told of the early growth of the Summerside club and termed it "one of the best in the district."

The guest speaker said Lions began in 1917 in Dallas, Texas, when 25 Lions were formed. In 1920 clubs had more than doubled and reached into Canada, by 1927 it had spread to Mexico, and China, making it truly international.

The speaker stated that as of yesterday 1962, Lions had reached 118 countries, comprising 647,800 members in some 18,500 clubs.

Reviewing the early projects of the Summerside Lions Club up to its present program, he noted the first fund raising effort undertaken was a minstrel show. Since then such projects were carried out as light bulb sales, a senior citizens' night, welfare projects, when the Lions Club has been in the news for its work for needy children is most outstanding, and providing aid in time of need and disaster.

Mr. Casley commented on the tremendous display of enthusiasm shown in the club, and said "enthusiasm makes fire; fire makes steam; steam makes power, and power makes a strong club."

The guest speaker stated public relations is what the public thinks of a certain business or group. He asserted the Lions Club must have good public relations with everyone, and all other groups.

Four new members were accepted into the club, and Mr. Casley told them that only hard work could bring results. Driver Hurt As Car Rams Parked Truck

SUMMERSIDE — Prince County Hospital authorities last night described the condition of George DesRoches, Miscouche, as "stable" after he was injured when he was struck by a truck while on his way to hospital Saturday night after having been injured in a motor vehicle accident.

His attending physician, Dr. S. R. Cameron, Summerside, said last evening DesRoches received facial lacerations and fracture, and shoulder fracture.

The accident in which Mr. DesRoches was injured occurred about 10:30 p.m. when a small car which he was driving was in collision with the rear of a parked truck.

The truck, driven by George MacKinnon, O'Leary, was said to have been parked on the side of the Trans-Canada Highway about 400 yards east of the military road of RCAF Station Summerside near the Curran and Briggs paving plant, with two flat tires on the rear.

Mr. MacKinnon was nearby awaiting assistance when the car driven by DesRoches struck the rear of the parked truck. Damage to the truck was minor, while the small car of English make sustained about \$80 damage.

DesRoches was taken to the Prince County Hospital by Compton's ambulance. RCMP from the Summerside detachment investigated.
