Speeders Fill Docket; Accused Is Fined \$30

William Allan Cotton of Charlottetown was fined \$30 and costs when he appeared in traffic court yesterday on a speeding charge.

There were 14 other speeding cases on the docket. James Clayton Withrow, Halifax; Steven Otis Costain of King City, Ont.; and Beverly Charles Haslam of Emerald, P.E.I., were each fined \$20 and costs.

Mrs. Jean MacEachern, Hampton; Paul Reginald Hoy, Charlottetown; and Ronald William Woodrate of Charlottetown were each fined \$15 and costs.

Arthur Henry Jones, Montreal; William Arthur MacEachern, Trenton, N.S.; Malcolm Thomas Esmond MacLeod, Charlottetown, was fined \$10 and costs for operating a vehicle showing dealer's plates for a purpose not allowed with such license plates.

William Reginald Bryan, Parkdale, was fined \$10 and costs.

WINDY FEVER, MONSOON: David Shelby Senter, Elmsdale; Albert Ernest Dowling, Charlottetown; David Gordon Hickock, Fredericton; David Wallace Rodd, West Royalty and Thomas Esmond MacLeod, Charlottetown, were each given a \$10 fine with costs.

Richard Darrell Casford, Charlottetown, charged with driving a motor vehicle while his driver's license was suspended, pleaded not guilty and the case has been set down for Magistrate's Court today.

Malcolm MacPherson, Charlottetown, was charged with operating a motor vehicle while not being the possessor of a driver's license. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$10 and costs.

Failure To Renew UIC Books Could Mean Fine Of \$500

A total of 150 employers in Queens and Kings counties still have not returned their employees' Unemployment Insurance Books for renewal.

C.L. Winchester, insurance branch supervisor of the Charlottetown office of the UIC said Monday that he hopes that all employers will co-operate by returning the old 1964 insurance books for renewal before the deadline date which is June 18.

Mr. Winchester said that the insurance office does wish to invoke the penalties prescribed by law for noncompliance, which includes fines of up to \$500, but would much rather have full co-operation of the employers in this matter.

Although the book replacement may appear to be only a matter of routine, it is extremely important for the workers concerned, particularly in the event of a claim for insurance benefits having to be filled at some time in the future.

Prince County Court Holds Busy Session

SUMMERSIDE — Clifford Blair Walsh of Albany had his case adjourned to June 18 to set a date for trial when he appeared yesterday in Prince County Court on a charge of unlawfully taking a motor vehicle with intent to operate it without the owner's consent.

Walsh, appearing before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald, pleaded not guilty to the charge.

Three accused appeared on charges of impaired driving. They were George Carl Murray of Carleton Place, Lloyd Cole, New London, and John Channing Coughlin of Miscouche. Murray was represented by Bernard St. Clair MacCabe and had his case adjourned to June 29 when a date will be set for trial. The plea was one of not guilty. Cole was represented by Melville Campbell and had his case adjourned to July 13. He also pleaded not guilty. Coughlin pleaded guilty and was fined \$75 and costs or 15 days with bail to be returned.

PLEADS NOT GUILTY — George Leonard MacDonald of Summerside was charged with escape from Prince County Jail while he was serving time on a liquor conviction. The accused elected trial by Magistrate and pleaded not guilty. The case was adjourned to June 17.

Five accused were charged with driving without due care and attention. John Hubert Campbell, St. Eleanor's, Alexander Sheldon MacLean, RCAF Station, and Robert Gardiner Jones also of RCAF Station were each fined \$10 and costs or five days. Leon Applebee, RCAF Station, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days and a fifth accused Charles W. Colette of RCAF Station, pleaded not guilty to a similar charge and had his case adjourned to June 17.

A Miscouche resident, Arnold Joseph Cameron, pleaded not guilty to a charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident and had his case adjourned to June 17 when a date will be set for trial.

Harold Mills, St. Eleanor's, was fined \$10 and costs or five days for failing to stop at a stop sign.

Paul Leslie Harding of Darnley was fined \$10 and costs or five days for crossing a solid white line.

Alan MacDonald of MacNeil's was fined \$10 and costs or five days for allowing a young boy who did not have a license to drive.

Lloyd Bernard MacDougall of Portage was fined \$10 and costs or five days for driving without a license.

A Belmont man, Wilfred Dale Yeo, pleaded not guilty to driving while his licence was suspended and had his case adjourned to June 17. G. Bruce MacDonald is counsel for the accused.

Three accused were charged with not transferring the registration of a motor vehicle. James Wilbert Doucette, St. Louis, and George Allison Ramsay of St. Eleanor's were each fined \$10 and costs or five days on the charge. Eric Joseph MacKinnon of Miscouche pleaded not guilty to the charge and had his case adjourned to June 17.

There were eight cases of illegal possession of liquor. Five of the accused were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. Two accused were remanded to June 22. Both being under age, they were instructed to refresh their memories and be prepared to tell the RCMP who got the liquor for them when they again appear in court. Magistrate MacDonald said that he is tired of hearing that these youths don't know who got the liquor for them. The last accused on this charge was remanded to June 17.

A Belmont man, Wilfred Dale Yeo, pleaded not guilty to driving while his licence was suspended and had his case adjourned to June 17. G. Bruce MacDonald is counsel for the accused.

One accused was remanded to June 17 on the charge of causing a disturbance.

A Linkletter Road man charged with fishing with two fishing poles was given a warning.

100 MPH Chase Ends In Court

A speeding charge following a 100 mile per hour chase by Sgt. Keith Wigelin resulted yesterday in a fine of \$100 and costs for Errol Frizzel, 19, of Cornwall in city police court.

Frizzel, who pleaded not guilty to the charge, also had his licence suspended for three months.

Sergeant Wakelin testified the accused had passed his unmarked car on the right, and he had to travel 100 miles per hour but was unable to catch up with Frizzel.

Magistrate James B. Haslam, QC, gave a fine of \$75 and costs to Lenar Sterling MacDonald, Churchill, on a conviction of driving without due care and attention. He did not suspend his license because "he depends on it for a living", but warned that another appearance in court this year would mean automatic suspension.

Ambrose Coady, Charlottetown, was fined \$125 and costs or 30 days when he pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving.

A Tracadie resident, Ivan Mullen, was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days on a charge of vagrancy. He pleaded not guilty.

Linus Albhorn, Rocky Point, was remanded without plea to June 19 on a charge of leaving the scene of an accident.

Three men pleaded guilty to a charge of drunk and incapable. Two were fined \$20 and costs or 20 days, and one was given a 20-day sentence, to end when he leaves for the mainland the end of this week. A man charged with a similar offense did not appear in court this morning and was remanded to June 19.

A charge of drunk and disorderly against a city man was dropped when the complainant, his wife, failed to appear in court.

Cabinet Changes Effective Today

Cabinet changes announced recently by Premier Walter Shaw, as well as the resignation from the cabinet of Hon. J. David Stewart, become effective today.

To bring the cabinet to full strength, Lloyd MacPhail (PC-2nd Queens) will be sworn in today as minister of tourist development and minister of industry and natural resources.

Education minister Dr. George Dewar will take the post of provincial secretary.

Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge and Dr. Hubert MacNeill, minister of health, will exchange portfolios. Fisheries Minister Leo Rossiter will assume the portfolio of municipal affairs.

City Police Report Three Accidents

City police reported three accidents in the city Monday.

Over \$100 damage was sustained by a 1964 car driven by Mrs. Walter MacDonald, 121 Water Street, in a hit-and-run accident Monday afternoon.

The accident occurred about 3 p.m. near the intersection of Water and Great George Streets. The MacDonald vehicle, parked at the time, was run into by a truck, subsequently abandoned by its driver.

An hour later, Judy Lea, 62 Great George Street, was involved in a collision at the corner of Upper Queen and Pond Streets. Resulting damage to the car she was driving was estimated at \$125. Driver of the other vehicle was not identified in the police report.

Earlier, at 1 p.m., a 1957 vehicle driven by Garfield W. MacPhail, Bonshaw, collided with a 1964 vehicle driven by John Orral Younker, Winsloe, near the intersection of Queen and Grafton. The Younker vehicle had stopped to avoid hitting a car pulling out of a parking space.

Important Notice about Old Age Security

The Parliament of Canada has amended the Old Age Security Act. Over the next five years the age at which the Old Age Security pension becomes payable is to be gradually reduced to 65. Eligibility for pension is subject to certain residence requirements.

In January, 1966 the Old Age Security Pension of \$75 a month will be payable to those aged 69; in 1967 to those aged 68; in 1968 to those aged 67; in 1969 to those aged 66; in 1970 and thereafter to those aged 65.
