

# New Rail Rate On Lumber Expected To Aid Maritimes

**MONCTON (Special)**—The Maritimes may soon be in a position to sell more forest products in central Canadian markets than they have ever done before.

That was a prediction made here by W.H. Collins, regional freight sales manager for Canadian National Railways' Atlantic region.

He based his forecast on railway plans to introduce a new rate structure governing the movement of forest products effective Feb. 12.

"The new rates are designed to accomplish but one thing: place Maritime forest industries on an equal footing with their competitors in Ontario and Quebec."

The new tariffs are one-half to four cents less per hundred pounds than those published at present. CN moved 1,314,308.000 pounds of forest products out of the Maritimes in 1961.

Mr. Collins said he thought the new rates ought to stimulate woods industries, particularly pulp production. "They should also act as an incentive on the development of hardwood products, for such things as flooring, wedges and so on are eligible for the new rates."

Under the present rate structure, a shipper pays 43 cents per hundred pounds on a minimum loading of 30,000 pounds in freight cars of 40 foot length or less between Moncton and Montreal. He pays the same rate on a minimum loading of 42,000

pounds in cars more than 40 feet in length.

These charges will remain. But with them on Feb. 12 will come new rates designed to encourage shipments in greater lots.

Compared with the 43 cent rate given for a shipment between Moncton and Montreal, the new structure would allow a 41 cent rate on a 60,000 pound shipment, a 40 cent rate on a 70,000 pound shipment and a 39 cent rate on an 80,000 pound shipment over the same route.

The charge between Moncton and Toronto, which at present is 62 cents for 30,000 and 42,000 pounds shipments, would be 59 cents per hundred for 60,000 pounds, 57 cents for 70,000 and 56 cents for 80,000.

K.P. Letterick, freight rates officer for the region, said a shipper who moved a considerable amount of goods steadily over the year could save thousands of dollars in transportation costs under the new rates.

**PLANT DESTROYED**

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—A fire which flashed through the Superior Concrete Products Limited plant in nearby Lambeth Wednesday did damage estimated at \$250,000. Lambeth's volunteer fire brigade was called to the plant but firemen said the blaze was out of control when they arrived. Only the frame skeleton of the plant remains. Cause of the fire was not known.

1. Three hearts. A player who passes originally is assumed to lack the values for an opening bid, and his partner who then opens the bidding should interpret any response made by that player in that light.

For this reason some responses made by a passed player are not regarded as forcing, even though they would have been forcing if made by an unpassed hand. For example, in this case, the jump to three hearts does not obligate North to bid again, whereas he would have been forced to continue if South had not passed previously.

In line with this theory, the jump raise by the responder may be shaded by one or two points if he passed originally.
