

P.E.I. Medical Society Begins 2-Day Session

Some 70 doctors from all parts of the province this morning begin sessions of the two-day annual meeting of The Medical Society of Prince Edward Island.

Montgomery Hall is headquarters for the meeting, but functions will be held at P.E.I. Hospital Nurses Residence, the Charlottetown Hotel, and the Charlottetown Curling Club.

Dr. Eric M. Pound, Charlottetown, president of the society, will preside over this morning's business session, which begins at 10 o'clock a.m. Reports on such topics as medical education, traffic accident, child health and aging will be given.

The Canadian Medical Association president, Dr. Frank A. Turnbull of Vancouver, will address the delegates at a mid-day luncheon today at the P.E.I. Hospital Nurses Residence, probably discussing the current Canadian medical scene.

After lunch, the doctors will hear clinical talks by Dr. Hamish W. McIntosh, associate professor of medicine, University of British Columbia, and Dr. Burke Ewing, professor of surgery, University of Ottawa.

Dr. MacIntosh will speak on "medical investigation and management of patients with renal calculi," and Dr. Ewing will discuss "thyroid surgery". Several island doctors will participate in discussions of the reports following these presentations.

Tomorrow morning the doctors will give into the "Hall Report" on medical care, to which the P.E.I. association made voluminous recommendations.

Dr. John Maloney will be chairman of the symposium leading the discussion.
