Rehabilitation Council Work Praised By Deputy Minister

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
Deputy Minister of Welfare and Labor W.W. Reid addressed the Summerside Presbyterian Church Men's Association last evening during which he spoke in glowing phrases of the newly established rehabilitation council.

Mr. Reid related the many phases of the work of the council regarding medical rehabilitation free training including various trades and professions as well as providing a portion of the room and board, and placement of these handicapped people in order to make them useful citizens.

Mr. Reid was introduced by J. Watson MacNaught, QC, and thanked on behalf of the club by A.H. Hickey.

The meeting was presided over by D.L. Miller, president.

Mr. Reid outlined first of all the various phases of work in the department of welfare and labor accentuating labor. He spoke briefly of the many unmarried women in the province but more regretfully of their offspring.

He told of how the staff of the child welfare department places the children in homes and the various ways of trying to get them established, providing for them up to the age of 17 and in some cases 18 years. He told the meeting that, "We were extremely fortunate in this pro-

U.S. Writers Urge Slowdown On Road To Summit Meeting

Two eminent politicians — both of them out of office — are urging a slowdown in the race to the summit.

Dean Acheson, secretary of state under President Truman, and Lester Pearson, external affairs minister in Canada's St. Laurent government, say that plans for next spring's meeting of heads of government with Premier Khrushchev are a surrender to Soviet pressure.

Pearson, meeting reporters in Halifax during a political speaking tour, said the West shouldn't abandon traditional methods of consultation by normal diplomatic channels.

"We are becoming victims — although I don't like that word — of the Soviet pattern of diplomacy by the man at the top."

UNPOPULAR VIEW
This viewpoint is bound to be unpopular now that the Western powers — France possibly excepted — believe that there is nothing to lose by sitting down with Khrushchev and talking about his demands, now a year old, that Western occupation forces be withdrawn from West Berlin.

It will be remembered that at the time he said they must go within six months. Later he said there was no deadline but it's obvious he would like to see them disappear.

Acheson, speaking to parliamentarians from North Atlantic Treaty countries in Washington, said of Khrushchev's demand: "Over and over and over again he has stated that the object of his policy is the withdrawal of foreign troops from overseas bases."

"And I think that we must respect Mr. Khrushchev. I think that we must see that when he strikes he strikes at the jugular. There is no fooling around with minor issues. He's striking right at the heart of the West."

Austrians Said Unduly Sensitive

TORONTO (CP) — The Austrian embassy "seems to be unduly sensitive" in its complaints about the CBC television program "No Return," the show's producer, Roland Weyman, said Monday night.

The embassy protested against the program to the government on grounds that it depicted an Austrian village still in Nazi control long after the Second World War and gave "a completely distorted picture of conditions in Austria."

"It was not set anywhere in particular," he said. "It could have been any small European village."

The only identifying aspect was that the village was having a Mozart festival, but plenty of European villages stage them, he added.

The half-hour program was broadcast Oct. 28 as the first in the CBC's winter "Unforgotten" series. Produced in the CBC's Toronto studios, it told the story of a man who returned to his village after the war to reclaim his factory. A former concentration camp guard had taken over both the man's identity and his factory and the returnee was shot when he attempted to assert his own identity.

Tory Policies Are Attacked
BATHURST, N.B. (CP) — Progressive Conservative defence policies came under attack from Liberal leader Pearson at a public meeting here Monday night.

He said his party will "vigorously oppose the decision of Prime Minister Diefenbaker's government to equip Canadian forces with weapons that can be used for the defence of Canada only with the authority of another country."

The defence department was a "classic example of fumbling and bungling." It provided "a dozen examples of inept administration."

"We learned recently, after Defence Minister Pearson and some of his colleagues had conferred with U.S. counterparts at Camp David, that nuclear weapons would be stored in Canada, and that Bomarc missiles would be fitted with nuclear warheads. . . . Our air force will be supplied with weapons for the defence of Canada which will be under the control of a foreign power."

NIGHT RIGHT
While the United States was a friendly power, it was not right that "a single country should control the defence of another. That is how our present government carries out a pledge to free Canada from American control — that is how it stands up to the Americans."

LONGEST CHUTE JUMP

WASHINGTON (AP) — The air force Friday claimed that the longest parachute jump in history was made this week from an open balloon gondola 76,400 feet over New Mexico. Capt. Joseph W. Kittinger, 31, made the leap, the air force said, surviving temperatures that ranged as low as 104 degrees below zero in the descent to the desert at the White Sands missile range in southern New Mexico. The air force said he was in "good shape" after the drop.
