ASHFIELD, Mass. (AP) — Several New England maple syrup farmers are banking on a little one-cent pill to boost production and improve the quality of the syrup. The pill and its functions were described here by Linwood Lesure, director of the National Syrup Council and treasurer and co-ordinator of the Berkshire Pioneer Maple Producers. He said a pill is being tried on each maple tree days before the sap is to be flowed. For six weeks it controls bacterial growth which formerly clogged the tubes and often resulted in a poor grade syrup. These micro-organisms, Le-

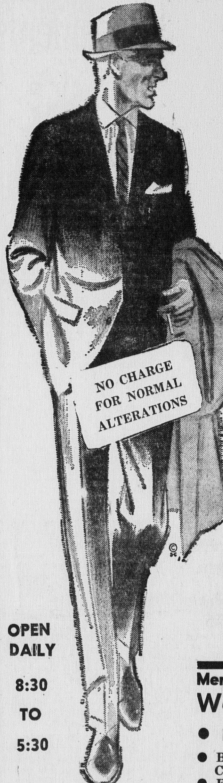
