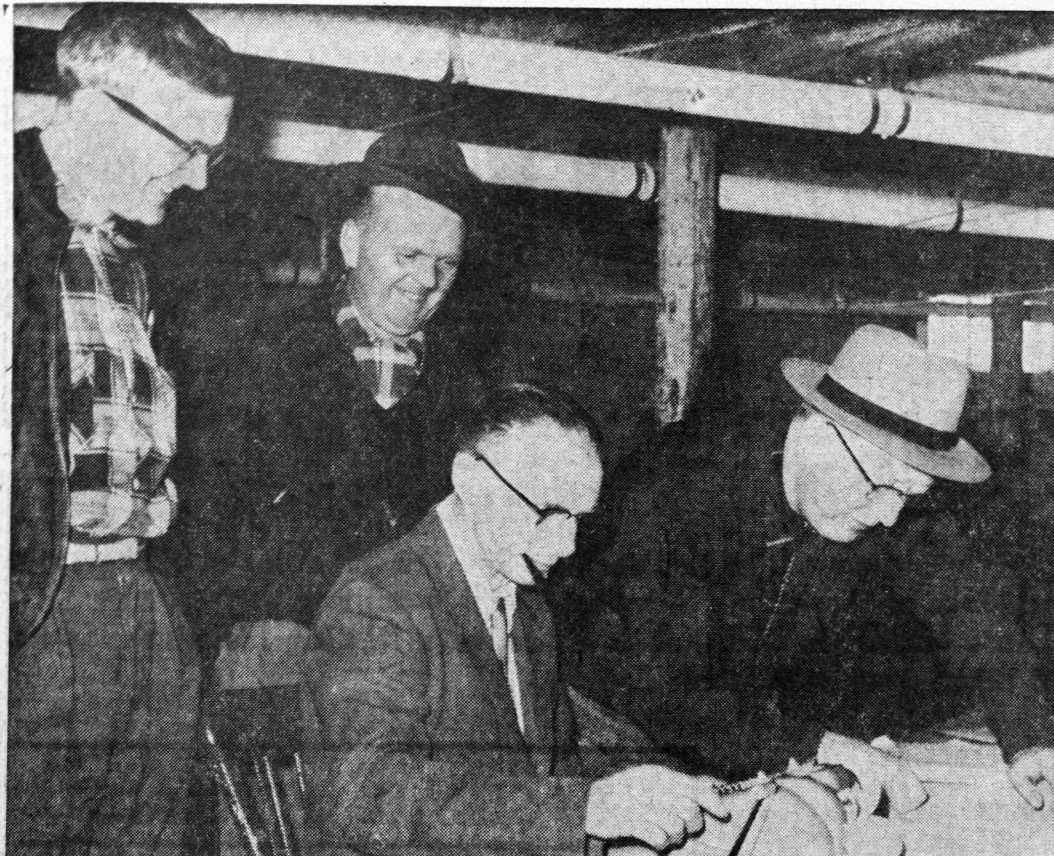


# R.C.A.F. Begins To Airlift Spring Supplies To North

EDMONTON (CP)—The RCAF has begun to airlift its spring supply of food and material to isolated northern weather stations deep inside the Arctic Circle.

Four Flying Boxcars will be in use at one time. Weather conditions permitting, the engines of the big planes will not have a chance to cool down in the 10-to-40-below-zero weather during the operation.

Mould Bay, Eureka, Alert and Sachs Harbor. A parachute drop of 4,600 pounds of food and mail will be made at Sachs Harbor, where there are no landing facilities for the Boxcars. The craft will land at all others.

## Results Of Declaration Day Proceedings In Prince Co.

A total of 17,295 votes—including the armed services vote—were cast in Prince County in the March 31 federal election, it was revealed yesterday when returning officer W. L. Delaney held declaration day proceedings at Kensington. Progressive Conservative Dr. Orville H. Phillips received 10,444 votes; Liberal J. Watson MacNaught got 6,536; and CCF candidate Cyrus Gallant 215.

Following were the official results by polls: The enumerators had 19,316 civilians eligible to vote and 512 in the Armed Forces. Eighty-eight per cent cast their ballots. Mr. Delaney, since being appointed returning officer in 1944 has served in this capacity in five federal elections and two provincial plebiscites.

## Actor Queried By Customs Men

LONDON (Reuters)—Customs officials questioned actor Sir Laurence Olivier about a camera for 45 minutes Monday when he arrived at London Airport from New York.

His wife, actress Vivien Leigh, sat in the customs hall while the interrogation went on.

Later the actor, who is appearing in The Entertainer on Broadway, told reporters: "I did a very silly thing and brought the camera back for a friend who bought it for his wife. Of course I declared it, but there were quite a few questions to answer and I had to pay a lot of duty on it."

## Deputy Trade Minister Quits To Take Private Business Job

OTTAWA (CP)—Mitchell Sharp, one of Canada's top civil servants, is resigning as deputy trade minister and is expected to take a job in private business.

Mr. Sharp, 46-year-old economist and grain trade expert, has held a series of key posts in the finance and trade departments since entering the federal government service in 1942. His present salary is reported to be \$17,000.

Trade Minister Churchill said in an interview Monday his deputy has asked for several weeks leave of absence to investigate "several attractive offers" from private business.

"I have received no formal resignation from him," the minister said. "I am to see him again at the end of the month when we will discuss this further."

Mr. Sharp said little about the situation. "The reports of my resignation are correct," he was reported as saying.

He was economic policy director in the finance department in 1950 when former Liberal trade minister C. D. Howe picked him to be one of his assistant deputy ministers. He was a major troubleshooter for Mr. Howe, especially in grain-marketing matters. He became associate deputy minister in 1950, and moved up to the top civil service post in the department last year with the retirement of deputy minister William F. Bull.

Mr. Sharp's name was drawn into the recent election controversy over a confidential economic report made to the former Liberal government a year ago. His signature was on the report. Prime Minister Diefenbaker said the Liberals hid the report which, he claimed, indicated the recession was beginning early last year.

## Offers Crew For Mayflower

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—A crew was offered the owners of the Mayflower II Monday by the master of the Susan Constant II in an effort to arrange a race between the replicas of the historic 17th century ships.

A race was proposed recently by Henry Hornblower of Boston, Mass., president of the organization which owns the Mayflower providing crews could be obtained.

Hornblower noted the Mayflower's crew had scattered following the vessel's Atlantic crossing last year from England to Plymouth, Mass.

"We can provide him with a crew," said John Hughes Curtis, Jr., master of the Susan Constant. "We'd rather sail against his crew, but we would have no trouble getting a crew locally."

The Susan Constant is the largest of three ships duplicated to commemorate last year's 350th anniversary of the founding of Jamestown, Va., the first permanent settlement in the New World.

## Large Congregations Attend Easter Services In S' Side
