

# Hunting Season Open, Duck Situation 'Good'

The opening of the hunting season this morning looks good despite the fact that the province's duck population apparently has experienced a considerable decrease from former years.

The local weatherman predicts a rather calm day for shooting with light winds in the morning changing to southerly 15 later in the day.

Skies are expected to be clear during the day with a low temperature of 32 degrees for the Charlottetown area with a high temperature of 37. High tides at Charlottetown today are 1:56 a.m. and 3:18 p.m. Sunrise is at 7:23 and sunset at 6:35.

A good number of black and teal ducks will likely be bagged today as well as a number of geese.

Up to and including the first week of October, ducks as well as geese were scarce but now there seems to be an influx of birds in most areas of the province. This opinion is based on the fact that these birds have showed up suddenly due to the opening of the hunting season in New Brunswick Oct. 1.

Open season on ducks and geese in other areas of the Maritimes is said to have caused birds to invade the Island for refuge.

RESTING UP

Heavy shooting in other parts of the mainland during the past two weeks, has apparently put birds on the wing which have naturally headed here for a couple of weeks rest until they are again put to flight after encountering Island hunters, by then it shouldn't make too great a difference because northern red legs and thousands of geese will have arrived.

This sudden increase in duck population is attributed in a small way to the southern migration now underway but such a marked improvement in so short a time could only have come about by the fact that the majority of these birds came from the west and not the north.

Geese have been sighted in sizable flocks in parts of the Island but stubble feeding is still spotty as the big migration is just getting underway.

For the past two weeks or more blinds have been springing up all over the province in marshes, on points, on river edges, in fields and on the water, as a number of gunners converged to their favorite location to make preparations for opening day.

REPORTS VARY

Reports from hunters concerning the duck situation this year are varied. Some say there are plenty of blacks as well as teal around the rivers while other gunners protest, exclaiming the duck crop has reached an all-time low. A few even go so far as to say there are practically no birds at all.

Indications from hunters who have been checking seem to be that the large numbers are widely spread about the Island in various marsh areas and rivers. Where there are ducks

there exists a great number of them. Other areas where ducks have frequented in past years show practically no indication of birds, they claim.

A chat with a hunter who shot his limit in geese near Fullerton's Marsh during the first week of last year's season reveals ducks in good numbers only a few minutes drive from Charlottetown.

He says that geese are still scarce and doesn't expect to repeat last year's performance until the first week in November.

As far as native partridge go, there are about 3,000 in wooded areas along roads between Mt. Stewart and St. Peter's, says a sportsman who travels this area quite frequently.

The limit for ducks is six per day. Five geese is the day's quota and the partridge is limited at three birds a day per hunter.

## 'MPs Are Peoples' Servants, Not Masters,' MacLean States

MONTAGUE — In excess of 250 people attended the Progressive Conservative meeting at Murray Harbour North last night.

The meeting was chaired by Albert Fogarty, vice-president.

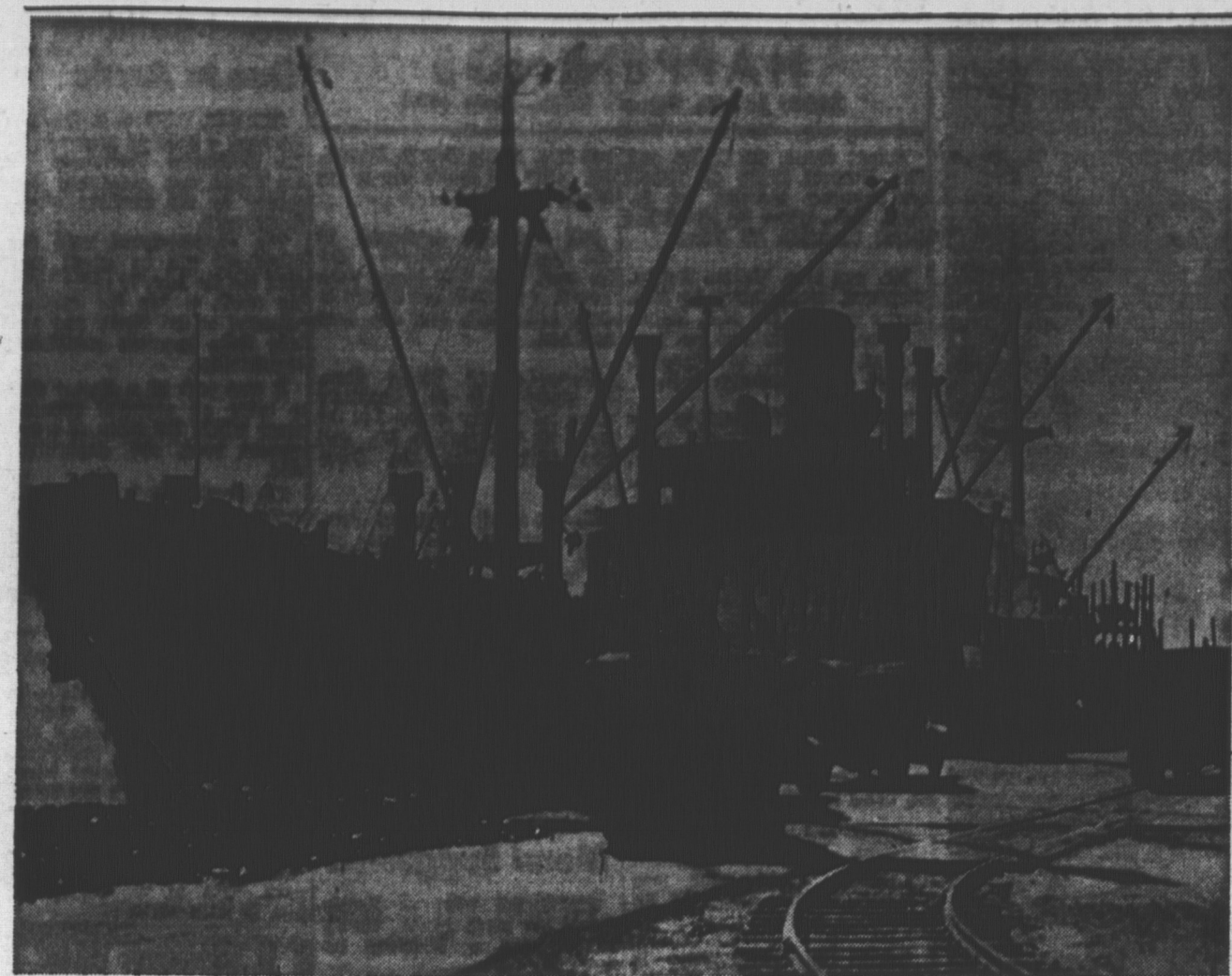
