

Anne Of Green Gables Casts Local Children

Five local boys and girls, several with some amateur stage experience, will appear for the first time with an all-professional cast in the world premiere of "Anne of Green Gables" as a stage musical.

The new production, the most expensive ever staged in Prince Edward Island, has its premiere July 27 at Confederation Centre Theatre as part of "Charlottetown Festival 65."

Another young actor, Ritchie Simpson, aged 11, makes his debut in the production. "John Drainie Invites You to Laugh With Leacock." All six are from Charlottetown.

Larry Hume, 11, and Larry Brazel, 12, have done some dancing in local productions. Amanda Hancox, appeared in the Circle Theatre Drama Festival and in a short film made recently by Canadian Industries Limited.

Janet Farrar, 10, and Palma Hynes, seven, will also appear in "Anne."

The Canada Council made a grant of \$10,000 towards the partial cost of the new production adapted by Donald Haeron from the L.M. Montgomery classic of a young girl in Prince Edward Island. The book, one of a series, has achieved world renown. Norman Campbell composed the music. Alan Lund is director.

Rotary Club Can Supply Needs Of Troubled World: Pettengill

In a world that needs love and understanding, Rotary clubs can supply those needs in great abundance, according to Charles W. Pettengill, Greenwich, Connecticut, president of Rotary International.

On a visit to the Maritime Provinces, Mr. Pettengill addressed yesterday's luncheon meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club and Rotary Anns at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Pointing out that world rotary clubs have a membership of 575,000 in about 12,000 communities in 123 countries, Mr. Pettengill said men of various backgrounds, different philosophies and who speak different languages have found the principles of Rotary to be "sound and profitable."

He said "all have the common project of furthering the doctrine of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man."

"What wonderful possibilities are ahead for Rotary if only we grasp that opportunity."

WORLD-WIDE ACCEPTANCE
Mr. Pettengill said that everywhere in the world "Rotary is

being accepted as a movement of goodwill and understanding."

Mr. Pettengill told his audience former Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev had expressed interest in the possible formation of a Rotary club chapter in Moscow.

The speaker suggested that if Mr. Khrushchev had not been deposed, a Moscow Rotary Chapter might have been a reality today.

According to Mr. Pettengill, Rotary clubs have "an amazing attendance record." He said that with a total membership of 575,000, Rotary meetings averaged an attendance of 78 per cent.

"This means," he said, "that 440,000 business and professional men are meeting weekly throughout the world and nowhere in the world is such a comparable force meeting with such regularity and unity of purpose."

Mr. Pettengill asked "what better medium exists than Rotary on which man can build. Let us live Rotary in all our relationships and do what we can to hasten the day all mankind

will leave in peace and harmony."

The speaker was introduced by Rotary's district governor, Gordon Elman, Sydney, N.S.

Thanks to Mr. Pettengill on behalf of Rotary were extended by Chief Justice Thane Campbell of the Summerside Rotary Club.
